VIVA VIVALDI! Festive Music of the Italian Baroque May 12 - 7:30 PM

The Gretchen Iben Arts Series has an excellent concert scheduled for Friday evening, May 12 at 7:30 p.m. The Choir of Westminster Church will present music of Handel and Vivaldi accompanied by a festival orchestra conducted by Thomas Clark-Jones. The concert opens with the brilliant "Coronation Anthem I: Zadok the Priest" by G.F. Handel. This is one of the composer's most dazzling works. It was written for British coronations, and is the music sung during the actual crowning of the new monarch. Its joy is unbounded and is delightful and once heard, one never forgets the entrance of the choir and three trumpets in the first movement! It about takes your breath away.

Following the Handel opening work, our guest soloist Jonathan Manley Hudson, countertenor from Central Pennsylvania, joins the orchestra for a performance of the dramatic setting of the "Stabat Mater" by Antonio Vivaldi. It is one of Vivaldi's most stunning works for solo voice and orchestra. The 'Stabat Mater' is one of the few sequence hymns still recognized by the Roman Church as a crowning glory of Good Friday services. Its text is about the Blessed Virgin standing at the foot of the cross of her son as he gives his life for the whole world. The voice is as stunning as the music itself. It was written for male alto, or countertenor. This unusual voice part is used by choirs of men and boys and as a solo voice in Baroque oratorios rather than the female alto. It is a difficult art aspired to by very few artists. Mr. Hudson is a native of western North Carolina and began his education at Appalachian State University in Blowing Rock, N.C. Graduating with honors, he moved on to the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, where he honed his skill as a countertenor, as well as a standard tenor, and earned his Master of Music degree in vocal performance. He is extremely talented, and the voice is amazing.

The final work of the evening is the "Gloria" by Vivaldi. This is the famous work that was the first of the composer's works to be found toward the end of World War II. Until this time, the name Vivaldi was known only because of several Vivaldi concertos that were transcribed for organ by Bach. With new scholarship beginning after 1945, the works of this superb Italian were discovered, slowly at first, and then in huge volumes of works ... all superb. Vivaldi was known as the "Red Priest" because of his shock of bright red hair. Even though ordained as a Priest, Vivaldi seldom celebrated mass, but instead chose to work in a school for orphaned girls where he taught them music ...both playing instruments and singing. This wonderful concert setting of the Gloria from the Ordinary of the Mass is a true masterwork. The choir brings its fine musicianship to the work and soloists soprano Ashlie Schlatweiler, countertenor Jonathan Hudson, and alto Alencia Norris grace the performance as well. You will be familiar with much of this music and it will still be a great delight. Come and enjoy!

PEORIA BACH FESTIVAL June 2 - 7:30 PM

Then on Friday evening, June 2, at 7:30 p.m., Westminster Church will be the venue for the opening concert of the Peoria Bach Festival. This is our second year to receive this honor of providing the opening organ recital for the series. The honor comes because of our magnificent pipe organ built in 1989 by the firm of Visser-Rowland of Houston, Texas. It is a perfect vehicle for the music of J.S. Bach, the focus of the festival. This year's soloist is Dr. Susan Klotzbach, professor of organ at Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington. She holds both Master's and Doctoral degrees from the prestigious Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, and has taught at several fine institutions of higher learning, beginning with Houghton College in New York State and culminating with her appointment to the faculty of music at Illinois Wesleyan. She is also the organist at the Kennilworth Union Church in suburban Chicago and has been the organ accompanist for the Bach Festival for many years. We are pleased to present her as the opening soloist in a major recital. The music will be mostly Bach, but can also include some other pieces related to the Master's work or in honor of him. It will be a thrilling evening of music, and admission is free. Bring a friend or two. You are always welcome at Westminster Church ... 1420 West Moss.

From the April 18 Meeting





Westminster received a thank-you letter from the Boys and Girls Club for the quarterly Mission gift of \$150.

Rev Clark-Jones attended a meeting of the Peoria Clergy for Racial Reconciliation at Westminster on April 18.

The third annual Westminster Sing! Choir Camp is set for June 19-23.

Dorothy Crozier will attend the required training regarding the meals and snacks provided by School District 150 for the choir camp.

Volunteers are needed for the bus transportation and breakfast and lunch period for the choir camp.

Rev. Clark-Jones will be in St. Louis attending Transitional Church Training from May 15-19.

A program topic of Water Resources is scheduled for September 30 at Westminster. Two speakers are lined up for the Saturday session. One speaker will focus on local issues and the other will speak on international issues.

April's 4th Sunday Luncheon will feature Mediterranean Cuisine. May will feature German food.

The Finance Committee agreed to sell all of its WDF position in Caterpillar, 900 shares, and buy 1,000 shares of Exxon -Mobil.

Robert Baird will no longer waive commissions on gifts of securities to Westminster. Elder Leonard is investigating using Scott trade for such transactions.

The WestMark Food Pantry served 1,189 in March.

The enrollment of WICC will increase to seven children after Easter.

Common Place is having their Walk for Literacy on May 6.

The sewage pumps in the church have been replaced.

The cardboard recycling container was replaced with a landscape waste container.

A Presbyterian youth group from Pittsburgh will be staying in the Parish Hall on the night of June 25. The group of 20 needs only a place to sleep and access to bathrooms.

Elder Bell is getting bids to repair the roof of the church.

HUNGRY BULLETIN

Meals on Wheels in Peoria and other nearby cities are delivered by Neighborhood House. Eligible participants receive at least one meal per day Monday through Friday between 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. This program is more important than volunteers just delivering food to those who need it. It is also about their showing "care and concern and help that extends far beyond the noon hour." The program also gives a sense of security to the participants, because it is something that they can look forward to and rely upon each day. "There is comfort in such routine, especially when the driver may be the only person the participants talk to the entire day." Neighborhood House has brought a great amount of success to the Meals On Wheels program. Since 1971, over one million meals have been delivered. Most of the eligible participants are senior citizens, but there are some meals delivered to people under the age of sixty who have medical problems. Participants also receive "social contact, educational materials, newspapers & pet food (if needed)." More than 1200 meals a week are delivered in Peoria, West Peoria, Pekin, and other surrounding towns. This program makes a huge difference in the lives of its participants. Lately in this country there has been talk that this wonderful program may be defunded. Let's all hope and pray that this never happens.

THE GREENING POWER OF GOD

To paraphrase a line from an old Broadway tune, "Green is bustin' out all over!" Spring is the perfect time of the year for the Easter season. Unlike Jesus' birth, the Bible does tell us exactly when the Resurrection occurred. Because we know when the Passover was celebrated, people were able to figure out from the gospel narratives when Easter should be celebrated. Actually, many biblical scholars believe Jesus was born in the spring too, but it is nice to have our holidays spread out more in the year. It seems that all of nature comes out of its respective winter tombs to burst forth with new life. The green of the grass and leaves of plants and trees create a vibrant 'greenness" in our community. The swell of runners and walkers on the streets and sidewalks demonstrates that people are paying attention to their own physical life force.

Yet, greenness is not just a physical reality, it can be a spiritual one as well. No, I'm not talking about experiencing God on the golf course. I've never bought that excuse for not coming to church. Not that appreciating the wonder of nature cannot be a spiritual experience. Hildegard of Bingen, a 12th-century Benedictine abbess, was also a theologian, visionary, musical composer, spiritual director, preacher, and healer. A word which runs through much of her writings is "viriditas," which literally means "greenness" in Latin. Translated into English as "viridity," the word means vitality, fecundity, lushness, verdure, or growth. For Hildegard, viriditas was the divine force, which brings about both spiritual and physical health. Not surprisingly, the medicines she used for

healing were made from herbs. People came to her for both physical and spiritual healing.

Sister Hildegard spoke of the "greening power of God." As the Creator, God planted a life-force within every living thing. But what happens when a living thing does not receive nourishment? It dies, of course. Every gardener knows that his or her plants need water and nutrients in the soil to grow. In our baptismal liturgy we remember the Bible's testimony to God's saving water. From the opening verses of Genesis, where we read that God's spirit moved over the water and brought forth life, to the gospels in which Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River is described, the bible is filled with water images that mark creation, salvation and renewal.

Spring brings forth a surge in activity. With the warming temperatures outside, there are so many possibilities for activity. But, we can become active in ways that do not nourish our spirits. Some activities deplete us. In this time of increased activity, take time to discern what nourishes your spirit. Maybe, say "no" to some things that do not. Allow God to exercise some "greening power" within you.

As suggested by the Worship Calendar of the Presbyterian Church USA for those churches who do not celebrate Communion every Sunday, we will be celebrating Communion every Sunday in the Easter season. The Lord's Supper is spiritual nourishment for our spiritual growth. Meeting Christ at the Table, joining our lives with his, taps into that "greening power of God." The divine life-force Jesus shared with his disciples in the Upper Room is offered to us to nourish us as disciples.
