



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church.

Acts 2 tells the story of the Holy Spirit descending on the disciples as tongues of fire, and casts them from their place of contemplation and fear, out into the streets, preaching in languages they couldn't understand for the benefit of all the people gathered there. They told the story of Jesus and taught the people what it meant. This was the beginning of faith formation, meant to inspire and encourage all who gathered into a lifetime of faith. Then as today, the Holy Spirit empowers anyone who will receive to change their lives, to radically share, to gather across lines of difference, to join in communities of compassion and care.

On Sunday, JUNE 4, when we gather, we will receive the Pentecost Offering. Gifts to the Pentecost Offering celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit and support our congregation's efforts of faith formation in the first third of life, from childhood through young adulthood. Our congregation will retain 40 percent to be used for local missions. # THE SEASON OF THE SPIRIT

In the liturgical calendar of the Christian church, Pentecost should be a big celebration day, but for many churches it really isn't made to stand out. We, of the "frozen chosen" variety of Protestants, shy away from anything "Pentecostal." Ironically, Pentecostals don't celebrate Pentecost. I guess they figure they are "Pentecostal" all the time and don't need to celebrate any particular Sunday. You'd think all those people that say they are "spiritual but not religious" would really come out for this one, but I doubt they will.

We've been skipping around the book of Acts since Easter. In this way the lectionary prepares us to understand the power of the Holy Spirit because we already know what it did in the formation of the Christian church. From a small group of followers, Christianity spread like wildfire. In just a few hundred years, Christianity was the official religion of the Roman Empire and was spreading beyond its borders. The whole title for this book of Acts is "Acts of the Apostles," but it would be more aptly named, "Acts of the Holy Spirit."

The Mainline Protestant Church has been pretty skittish about anything "spiritual." We are much better at being "religious but not spiritual." The truth is, neither camp — "spiritual but not religious" or "religious but not spiritual" is very effective or fulfilling. Neither camp gets the passion and the peace that the Holy Spirit offers.

In the past few decades, Mainline Protestant de-

nominations have been trying to bring back more spirituality into our religion. One of those ways has been releasing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper from the baggage of anti-Roman Catholicism prejudice and rediscovering its power to connect our spirits with Christ's spirit. Healing services have become commonplace in Presbyterian churches. Prayer receives more attention as a life-giving spiritual discipline.

So how do we tap into the power of the Holy Spirit? And when we feel a spirit moving us, how do we know it's the Holy Spirit? If the spirit is drawing you toward an action that the Bible disputes that Jesus would have done, then there is a high probability that it is coming from your own ego rather than the Holy Spirit. We have God's Word as recorded by previous witnesses to God's revelation of self in the

world. These witnesses were inspired by God's Holy Spirit to see, hear, and interpret the signs of God's holiness working in and for the world. If what you feel drawn to do or say does something for you, but not anyone else, then it is not likely the Holy Spirit is guiding you.

Jesus taught, for a new generation, the message of the Old Testament prophets. The Bible tells us these were words that the people didn't want to hear because they often responded: 'What's in it for me?' You see, when we fill ourselves with stuff for ourselves alone, we leave no room for the Holy Spirit to enter and reside. My first mentor in ministry paraphrased the Second Commandment, "You shall have no other gods before me," with the words: If you make a god of your own stuff, you will only be getting more of yourself." Thankfully, no one is beyond God's reach and God's Holy Spirit can enter us without our permission. When the Holy Spirit enters our being, some of our self has to go to make room for God.

Whenever I hear people say they are spiritual but not religious, I want to ask them what spirit they are talking about. If it's the spirit of God, tell me about the nature and character of your God. Tell me how God is leading and transforming your life. If you aren't sure about God, what do you know about this spirit in which you believe? What if we would be so bold as to witness to these so-called "spiritual but not religious," who are reluctant to make any kind of commitment to a particular spiritual path or to give witness to what they believe is transcendent

within themselves.

What if we were to tell others what our faith and our church mean to us and how our faith affects how we live our lives? What if we witnessed by our actions, and then explained we act this way or do these things for others because we are Christian? We might ask the "spiritual but not religious": "If this spirit that causes you to claim you are spiritual doesn't give meaning and purpose to your life in a

way that affects your actions and your relationships with others, do you need it? Does it have anything with which you can build relationships and help others?"

Like the disciples at Pentecost, we gather on Sunday in one place to empty ourselves. We empty ourselves of shame with confession. We empty ourselves of self-absorption by thanking and praising

# QUALIFIED CHARITABLE **DISTRIBUTION (QCD)**

Upon reaching age 70 1/2, individuals with a SEP, SIMPLE, or traditional IRA are required to start taking an annual distribution from the account (referred to as Required Minimal Distributions or RMDs.) However, the individual can instead contribute the RMD amount (or more) to a charity, such as Westminster, and then avoid having to pay income tax on the distribution. This strategy is better than taking a regular IRA distribution and then claiming a charitable deduction because it reduces the adjusted gross income (AGI) of the individual (or married couple filing jointly) on their tax return.

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a distribution paid directly from an IRA to a charity that is not taxable to the individual. A QCD represents a potential tax saving opportunity for an older individual taking a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from an IRA who regularly gives to charity.

# From the May 23 Meeting





- \* The Presbytery received and voted to approve the dissolution of call from Alan Finnian as the Executive Presbyter.
- \* The June 4 Pentecost Sunday service will include jazz music performed and orchestrated by Dave Hoffman.
- \* The water resource program "Gathering at The Well" is scheduled for Saturday, September 30 at 10:00. A luncheon will be provided. Speakers are Scott Reid, a city engineer, and Dr. Yunus Salami, a professor of engineering at Bradley University.
- \* The session approved up to \$500 from the benevolence fund, to be matched by the congregation, for support to Zoe Musser, a WICC mom.
- \* The session approved issuing a VISA gift card, limited to \$500, to be used for incidentals, purchased by Church Life, for vendors who do not submit invoices.
- \* Tote bags have been purchased for use as gifts or distributed to the congregation. The totes have the Westminster logo.
- \* WICC will participate in the June 10 Moss Ave. Sale and will have the garage sale on June 14 and 15.
- The food pantry served 1,417 in April.
- Westminster and Northwoods Community Church are meeting together to develop a cooperative mission strategy for Roosevelt School.
- \* A Presbyterian youth group from Pittsburgh will be staying in the Parish Hall on the night of June 25.
- \* Standard will make changes to the ductwork on one of the AC units in the Fellowship Hall.
- \* The session is considering repurposing William R. O'Neill Parish House to be used as a community center and contracting with a program director.
- \* The session is investigating a special use permit from the City of Peoria allowing the Parish House to be used as a community center.
- \* The session approved the scheduling of Jessica Bell's wedding on June 29 at 3:30.
- \* Chris Hovey has created 30-second videos to be used for TV spots beginning in August.

the One who makes all things possible. We meet together to silence our self-dialogues, so that we might engage in conversation with God and our fellowship of believers.

In our worship service, the spiritual takes form in physical things in our sacraments. Water, wine and bread become what St. Augustine described as "visible signs of invisible grace." At the table we are joined with Christ by following his commandment to eat bread and drink wine together, remembering his sacrifice for us. In our Communion liturgy I say the words: "These are holy things to make us holy." The bread and cup on this table are holy things because Christ, who promised us the comfort, the guidance, and the advocacy of the Holy Spirit to be his disciples in the world, makes them holy. When we come to Christ's table we empty ourselves that the spiritual body of Christ will enter into us, nourish our hunger for God, and strengthen us to love and live in the world as Jesus did.

"He changes a wilderness into a pool of water And a dry land into springs of water." (Ps.107:35)

When Jesus was baptized in the waters of the Jordan River, God sent down the Holy Spirit to rest upon him and dwell within him. To fulfill the yows of

our own baptism, we support our faith community because Christ commanded his disciples to live and work together to be his physical body in the world. The baptized are to be like water on parched land in the world. For this Jesus promised the gift of the Holy Spirit.

After Pentecost the Lectionary gives us Scripture readings that guide us to a greater awareness of the Holy Spirit. Pay attention to the Holy Spirit working in your life, be a witness to the in-dwelling of the Spirit for others.

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." (Romans 15:13)

# A Prayer for Peace

I have never met Marge Sutherland, but I have

heard a lot about her. What an outstanding life she has led. Marge was a member of the Women's Army Corps in WWII. She and her husband, Jim, worked together at an engineering firm. They had no children. The couple lived right next door to Westminster. They had two dachshunds. Marge was very active in the Moss-Bradley Association. She was also part of a group that met once a week and had spiritual study and breakfast together, which sounds similar to the Women's BiMonthly Bible Study that meets in the Westminster Parlor. Marge helped co-found WICC back in 1973, which has made a huge difference in the lives of so many high school girls and their infants. She was also a member of the Peoria Orchid Society. She collected orchids from all over the world, in addition to being a breeder of orchids. Marge also had a heated greenhouse built behind her house that included a lot of high technology. Back when Bradley University was still segregated, Marge and Jim remodeled their attic to house black men so that they had a place to live while attending school. One of these men, Joe Billy McDade, went on to become the first black federal appointed judge in central Illinois. Marge and Jim also rented out rooms in their house to various Bradley students over the years. Marge simply enjoyed the companionship. After she retired from the engineering firm, Marge became the office manager for the Great Rivers of Presbytery. I really enjoyed talking about the life Marge has led with Yvonne, as well as several different Westminster members.

Learning about these two amazing ladies has been a remarkable experience for me. They are both such an inspiration to me, and I hope to make my life just as meaningful as theirs has been.
