

At the time that I am writing, I am just a few days away from taking a vacation. This will be the first time in many years that Tom and I have gone on a vacation during which there are no obligations. We are going to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and there is no one there to visit and no one that needs assistance. We are just going because neither of us has ever been there before and we thought we might like to see this part of Canada.

My parents did not go on this kind of "frivolous" trip when I was growing up. Until I was a young teenager they were each taking college and graduate school classes every summer. I can only think of one vacation my parents took that did not involve their work in some way. Maybe that is why I have trouble leaving work behind -- in both body and mind.

The Bible tells us that after all the hard work of creating the world, God took a day off and just rested. Of course, it wasn't long before human-kind started pestering God with requests and getting into trouble from which they needed to be rescued. Isn't that the way it often is — you create, you work hard, but what you accomplish causes more work.

But, God stood firm in the belief that humankind needed to set aside time to rest. When sin insidiously entered into the world, fear and anxiety took root. Fear of not having enough — or not being enough—drove humans to push themselves to produce and to hoard. Then we started to judge our own worth, and that of others, by how much we produced. Somewhere along the way we began to define ourselves by the work we do and how much that work is valued by others.

Since 1967, Common Place Family Learning Center has worked on the center south side of Peoria, Illinois, to eliminate the root causes of poverty, racism, and injustice through education.

The first adult literacy program began in 1979. Over 4,000 adults have received help through one-on-one tutoring and small group classes for reading, writing, math and life skills. In addition, over 1,800 children have received after school homework help and enrichment programs for grades K-12.

### SHOES FOR WATER

Thank you for allowing us to set up collection boxes at Westminster Presbyterian Church during the month of August. Below is a brief description of the service project.

I assist the coordinator in an effort in central Illinois that collects new and used dry shoes for WaterStep (waterstep.org), a nonprofit organization that provides safe and reliable drinking water all over the world. By providing water treatment systems, health and hygiene education, and training people who are going into areas that have unclean water, WaterStep provides more people with access to clean water and sanitation.

663 million people - more than twice the population of the United States - lack access to safe water, according to the latest data from the World Health Organization and UNICEF. By working together, we can help reduce this number with an activity that provides funding for clean water projects to those in need.

That's why I'm asking you to join me to help our community, our environment, and the poor through collecting shoes. By working together, we can reduce this number with an activity that helps provide clean water to those in need through shoe donations. During August, The Iona Group and Float, in partnership with St. Ann's WATCH (We Are The Church) program, co-sponsor our annual shoe drive in conjunction with WaterStep. This is not an advertisement for The Iona Group, Float or St. Ann's WATCH. We are simply a group of individuals that sees an opportunity to help support a non-profit organization.

Any and all new and used dry shoes, including flip-flops, sandals, tennis shoes, and more can be collected, and they will be donated to WaterStep with several outcomes. The shoes are sold to an exporter, with Water-Step using part of the profits to fund water treatment systems in third-world countries. Of those donated shoes, usable shoes will be sold by local merchants in poorer regions of the world. The funds help these merchants provide a sustainable living for their families. Ad-

ditionally, recipients of these shoes will be protected from abrasions, parasites and mites in tandem with hundreds of tons in landfill waste being eliminated.

### Final Thoughts

Since we began this program in 2012, we've collected nearly 100,000 pairs of shoes. While other viable shoe collection efforts exist in this area, collecting shoes for WaterStep not only provides shoes for those in need but provides funding for safe drinking water projects all over the world - a winning combination!

### What Can You Do?

Safe drinking water shouldn't be a luxury. We hope you'll join with us in our efforts to end the water crisis.

Westminster Presbyterian Church has placed a drop-off box in the Narthex. Westminster will be collecting your shoes during the month of August. With your cooperation, we are helping those in need, and we are helping the earth.



# QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (QCD)

Upon reaching age 70 1/2, individuals with a SEP, SIMPLE, or traditional IRA are required to start taking an annual distribution from the account (referred to as Required Minimal Distributions or RMDs.) However, the individual can instead contribute the RMD amount (or more) to a charity, such as Westminster, and then avoid having to pay income tax on the distribution. This strategy is better than

taking a regular IRA distribution and then claiming a charitable deduction because it reduces the adjusted gross income (AGI) of the individual (or married couple filing jointly) on their tax return.

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a distribution paid directly from an IRA to a charity that is not taxable to the individual. A QCD represents a potential tax saving opportunity for an older individual taking a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from an IRA who regularly gives to charity.

Please sign up in the Narthex and we will give you a call. You are never obligated to help if you are otherwise occupied, and you can choose your volunteer times.




