



JAZZ AT WESTMINSTER



SESSION NOTES

From the August 8 Meeting





- The Westminster family received a thank you note from the Dream Center for our mission giving.
- * A thank you note was received from the Hebron Youth group for letting them stay one night in the Fellowship Hall wile on their mission trip on June 25.
- * The Session received the Annual Report of the Deacons.
- * Rev. Clark-Jones will serve on the presbytery's committee on ministry, a second, three year term.
- * Friends of the Riverfront is sponsoring a Jazz festival as a fund raiser on Saturday, September 16, from 2 to 5 PM. If it should rain that day, the venue would be moved into the Fellowship Hall in the William R. O'Neill Parish House.
- * Choir camp expenses were \$5, 570. Choir camp contributions were \$2,890 with another \$1000 earmarked from the Eisele Fund.
- * The WestMark Food Pantry served 1650 people in June.
- * Westminster Infant Care Center has a cash balance of approximately \$77,000.
- * WICC has hired a new van driver. WICC is fully staffed.
- * A church sprinkler pipe was repaired at a cost of \$159.
- * Illinois American Water Co. replaced the William R. O'Neill Parish House water meter at no cost to the church.
- * Ameren Illinois replaced the gas meters to the William R. O'Neill Parish House and church at no cost to Westminster.
- * Two of five commercials have been completed. Commercials will begin airing in September.
- * Central States Media is preparing a website page promoting the water seminar, September 30, "Gathering at the Well."





Dan Callahan and Tim Hartneck led a group of 33 participants around the exterior and through parts of the interior of William R. O'Neill Parish House. On hand was Pat Bensing, daughter of Cletis and Margaret Foley. Pat offered reminiscences of growing up attending Westminster and of her father's career as an architect. Mr. Foley's projects included the O'Neill Parish House, completed in 1957. Tim and Dan noted signature features of this facility, many of which were innovative at the time. Flexible classroom spaces, connection to its surroundings (sanctuary building, Frank Lloyd Wright designed home opposite, Moss Avenue and Malvern Lane streetscapes, etc.) and simplicity of design all were highlighted on the tour. 🏵

MOVING AHEAD... By Faith...

When we got home from our visit back east today, Tom showed me the newsletter from St. Stephen's Church in Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania. This is a church dear to his heart as he sang there as a boy chorister, and later studied with his Choirmaster, Clifford Balshaw, who also was the professor of organ at Wilkes College down the street.

Over many years, St. Stephen's moved from being the most affluent church in the entire area to a place where they were using more and more of their endowment funds just to stay afloat. After their last Rector left a couple years ago, Father Brian Pavlac became the "Priest-in-Charge, working quarter time. In this recent letter to his parish he had to admit that this wonderful church, that generously gave of itself to its community had been on the list of churches that could close within the next year or two. It was that serious.

His article was about 'manna from heaven'. It seems that two parishioners from St. Stephen's went to the Church Eternal in the past year and left a very substantial amount of their estates to the church - enough that it will now be possible for them to seek a new full-time Rector and revitalize many of the mission projects that have lain fallow for many years because of the fiscal crisis. Father Brian called it a miracle. But he also acknowledged that these persons had been deeply moved by the worship and witness of the church and felt it had a right, indeed, an imperative to not only survive, but thrive. There may no longer be a full church every Sunday at St. Stephen's, but the worship of God and the mission of the church would continue for many years because of their gift. It would give St. Stephen's a time of respite to find new ways to grow, serve and minister.

We here at Westminster, Peoria, are not quite where St. Stephen's has found itself in the past few years. We still have some significant funds upon which to draw. But they will not last forever, and I occasionally hear some of our folk comment that it might be five or ten years, but the day is coming to lock the door for the last time. But, Westminster has a vital ministry and outreach in this community. Our WICC program is among the best child care ministries anywhere. Our WestMark Food Pantry is depended upon by an average of 1500 people each month. Our outreach in our ministry of music draws capacity audiences, and our Summer Choir Camp gives excellent musical instruction and a wholesome place to learn and play for a week each summer to many children who are among the neediest in our city. This year we were successful in drawing

children black and white, poor and affluent, to come together to make music and make new friends. This was the original concept for the choir camp. I hope that Westminster becomes known for its hospitality and inclusive fellowship here in Peoria.

It is my prayer that these ministries and more that are now in the planning stage (for the Parish House, particularly) will continue to bring hope and caring to this area that sits so dramatically between the opulence of Moss Avenue and the poorest zip code in the state just down our bluff at the back of the parking lot. We

are a church that needs to survive even when days of paying our own way are not always possible. As you think about the ways you might structure your estate, think about the difference your gift to the ongoing mission of Westminster would make long after you start playing your golden harp and living in your mansion in heaven! The here and now is so very important. By helping Westminster to survive and thrive, even if only for a few more vears – it gives God the time needed to bring new life and new ministries to our church, which means so much to us. This is one parish I am sure deserves to have a bright fu-The stewardship of your worldly goods after you no longer need them is as important as making an honest and substantial pledge every year, as almost everyone in this congregation does already.

Think about this. There are days when I realize that a little 'manna from heaven' given by those no longer earthbound would do a great deal to further the Kingdom of God here in Peoria. Think about it as you plan your future. And as we look toward the beginning of yet another program year — through your generosity, we well might not have to think that there would be an end to new program years for a long, long time.

Identity theft has been the number one complaint to the FTC for fifteen consecutive years. It is a lucrative business. Reportedly earning more money than the illegal drug trade. Victims can spend weeks and months trying to recover their reputation.

The number one source for thieves to obtain information is physical items such as paper records, lost or stolen credit cards, wallets, and computers.

A majority of the responsibility lies with the companies that collect your information, but you must also take an active approach to protect your identity.

- Be careful with your info. Be aware when you're giving out personal information, especially on the phone or online.
- Keep passwords private. Use strong passwords with your laptop, credit cards, bank accounts and other important websites.
- Be wise about Wi-Fi. Before you send personal information over your laptop or smart phone on a public wireless network public place, see if your information will be protected. If you use an encrypted website, it protects only the information you send to and from that site. If you use a secure

wireless network, all the information you send on that network is protected.

- Safeguard your stuff. Use a locked mailbox and keep your personal documents in a secure place. Don't carry personal documents (passport, Social Security card) that you don't need on a daily basis.
- **Don't leave information behind.** Take your receipts when you leave a store or a restaurant.
- Check your credit. Take a look at your credit report every year and report problems right away.
- Shred to stay secure. Destroy envelopes, return address labels, unwanted receipts, checks, preapproved credit card applications and old tax returns that are no longer required to be retained.
