### **QUILT OF VALOR**

The mission of a Quilt of Valor is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing hand-made quilts. Specific guidelines for the size, fabric, batting, etc. are on the Quilt of Valor website.

Roger Luman served in the United States Marine Corp. 1958-1962 and we met in June 1953 and married in August 1965. Even on our honeymoon in Wisconsin, he "remembered" that his buddy Stan lived in Steven's Point. Stan's wife of three weeks was as excited as I was, but we were there two days watching slow pitch softball played by policemen (both Stan and his Dad were on the force). Throughout our married life, Roger continued his contacts with veterans.

Roger passed away on June 17, 2009, and I started to hear about Quilts of Valor (QOV) in 2011. I found a simple pattern and gradually found the fabric that "would work." My experience was

"intermediate" but with the support of friends who quilt, I learned as I went. My goal was to finish it before August 29, 2015 (our 50th Anniversary) but it didn't quite work out.

It was machine quilted by a friend Sue (Stillwater, MN) who was in high school when we lived in St. Paul, MN (1970-73.) She also made the required label. After it was quilted, it was returned to me to put on the binding and then send to the Central Illinois QOV coordinator in Wood River, Illinois. On March 8, 2016, the quilt was presented in Marian, Illinois, to a Marine that served in Vietnam. On that day eight men and one woman, veterans from Korea, Vietnam and Afghanistan, were also presented quilts. I was raised in Pinckneyville, Illinois, which is near Marian, so the quilt made a sentimental circle.

### WESTMARK FOOD PANTRY





### PENTECOST'S NEW CREATION

<sup>1</sup>When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup>And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup>Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. <sup>4</sup>All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. - Acts 2:1-4

Here it is, the special day just right for all those people who claim to be "spiritual but not religious" – Pentecost. This feast day celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit. But, Pentecost is also known as the birthday of The Church, which the "spiritual but not religious" avoid like the plague because of what business organizations call "personnel problems."

The problem with any organization has always been that human beings are flawed - we all sin. And, it is so much easier to be "spiritual" with just yourself and your "spirit" than commit to working with and for others. But loving one's "neighbors" is a necessary part of loving God. The first Jewish-Christians knew this from their faith of origin - Judaism. The first Gentile Christians learned this from the first evangelists who shared "the Good News" of Jesus Christ. About 500 years later, the religion of Islam became "organized." Muslims believe Jesus was the last great prophet before Mohammad and Jesus' name appears more often than Mohammad's in the Koran.

The Church has struggled with organization for 2000 years, just like any large group of people. Too much organization creates an exclusive "us" against "them" – "right" versus "wrong" theology and practices. Too little organization causes loss of focus on what is important and inability to put faith into action. The new Jewish Christians were not exactly organized, but the group was totally discombobulated when Jesus' promised gift of the Holy Spirit descended on Gentiles from far and wide. They had wanted to add more people to their group, but they hadn't expected they would be Gentiles! The Tower of Babel curse of mixed languages described in

Genesis had been reversed. All who gathered to hear Peter's power sermon in Jerusalem during the Jewish celebration of Pentecost (originally "Feast of Harvest" and later "Feast of Weeks") could hear the evangelist's words in their own native tongue.

The Jews then, as now, were defined by both their religion and their family culture. You were a Jew if your mother was a Jew. The Jewish followers of the Jewish Jesus had believed that it was necessary to follow all the religious laws and worship practices of Judaism - as Jesus had done. The Holy Spirit descending on the Gentiles (meaning non-Jews) was a major game-changer. A new religion was born that anyone who believed in Christ, as the promised savior God had sent to the world, and wanted to be Christ's disciple could join.

And join they did! The book of Acts tells us that 3,000 people joined on that Pentecost day. I doubt there were ushers there doing a head count, but it appears that a whole lot of people joined the movement, known as "The Way," that day. Christianity spread like wildfire after that.

The Church, as new and as disorganized as it was, opened its doors to people from 'all nations, tribes, and languages' and it grew, not just in numbers, but in mission and mutual love. As a church in Peoria, reputed to be one of the most segregated cities in America, Peter's vision should inspire us and all churches trying to be the body of Christ in this community. Peter was initially disturbed by the challenge of the vision, but God showed him that the vision was an opportunity for a new creation. Peter then looked upon the city, not as Jerusalem, but as the New Jerusalem, the shining city on the hill of the kingdom of God.

### PEORIA BACH FESTIVAL OPENS AT WESTMINSTER CHURCH

This year's Peoria Bach Festival celebrates its opening concert here at Westminster Presbyterian Church. The Bach Festival has been a part of Peoria life for more than a dozen years, bring-

ing some of the master's greatest works to life. Martin Dicke of Trinity Lutheran Church and John Jost of Bradley University are the movers and shakers of this Festival, and between them have built a distinguished celebration of the works of Bach and his close associates.

The Festival always features a major organ recital since this was Bach's main instrument, and he wrote a large opus for organ. We are particularly pleased to host this event of the Bach Festival since Westminster's magnificent organ is the most appropriate instrument in the area on which to play the works of Bach. Our instrument is built in the classic German tradition of mechanical key action and an enclosed free-standing instrument voiced with clarity and a genuine singing quality. Thus, coming together on this program is only logical.

The event is scheduled for Sunday evening, June 5 at 7:30 p.m. and features the internationally acclaimed organist James Kibbie. Dr. Kibbie is a native of Iowa and took his undergraduate degree at the University of North Texas at Denton, one of the country's top schools training organists. From there he went on to the University of Michigan earning Masters and Doctoral degrees from Michigan. Upon his graduation, he was invited to join the faculty at U of M and has continued there ever since. In recent years he has been Chair of this legendary organ school, succeeding Marilyn Mason, whose tenure exceeded fifty years. James continues that great tradition.

He has won major prizes in organ competitions across Europe and has recorded widely. His annual recital appearances include major venues in North America and Europe. James brings a torrential technique to the service of this great music. His reputation for nearly perfect execution of the great literature is legendary and there are few audiences not moved by his tremendous musicianship.

The program will feature the music of Bach, obviously. But Bach's output for the organ is so varied that a program will be anything but stagnant. As we take on this commitment to the Bach Festival, we hope that you will be particularly supportive of the effort. Make your plans now to be part of this great evening of music. Westminster participates in the Festival courtesy of the Gretchen R. Iben Fund and others who support the Iben Art Series throughout the year.

### **HUNGRY BULLETIN**

The Elmhurst Yorkfield Food Pantry began in 1983 by members of the Yorkfield Presbyterian Church in Elmhurst, Illinois. The members of the church saw how important it was to provide assistance for hungry people in their "own back vard." This food bank was not utilized by many people at first, but it now helps an average of 300 families per month. Some people use the food pantry only temporarily, while others visit it on a regular basis. A great deal of the food that is available at the bank is bought from the Northern Illinois Bank. Other donations include items that are donated from food drives by local churches and businesses. This food bank has longer operating hours than a lot of food banks, which makes it convenient for visitors to come when they are able to. People can visit the pantry on Monday evenings, Thursday afternoons and Thursday evenings, and Saturday mornings. Items at the pantry are available on a firstcome, first-served basis. Visitors are allowed to come as often as once a month. The items that are generally available include canned and boxed food items, produce, baked goods, toiletries, and cleaning supplies. Frozen meat is often available as well, which is something that a lot of food banks do not offer. Every family that visits the food bank is given a shopping cart to "shop" the shelves in the pantry. Each family is allowed a certain number of items, so the more members there are in a household, the more items they may select. Because this food pantry has the resources to offer more options than many other food pantries, it is no wonder why it has become so successful.

### SESSION NOTES FROM THE MARCH SESSION MEETING AND THE MARCH SESSION RETREAT

Received a thank you from the Center for Prevention and Abuse for our continued support.

Received a thank you from Rev. Patricia Stetson-Warning for our efforts in the Celtic Worship on St. Patrick's Day service with United Presbyterian Church.

Received a thank you from the Board of Pensions of the PCUSA for the 2015 Christmas Joy Offering which was applied towards the Assistance Program.

The session is considering having an outdoor Jazz Service.

In April more than \$70,000 has been drawn down from the development fund for budgeted expenses associated with the air condition system for the church.

\$475 in gifts have been received for the Peace for Peoria event.

The session authorized up to \$250 from the Peacemaking offering to be applied towards Peace for Peoria event if needed.

The food pantry served over 1,700 people in March.

The session approved Ashley Foster to be hired for 15 hours per week at \$12 per hour.

Ruyle has begun the work on the sanctuary cooling systems and installation is almost complete.

Because the lawn mower has been repaired, Pat Flynn, our maintenance manager, will mow the lawn this spring.

The cleaning of Malvern Lane has been contracted to LJ's Lawn Service. Westminster's portion of the fee is \$300 with adjacent neighbors making up the difference.

Dan Callahan arranged for 3 loads of mulch to be delivered to the church.

In memory of her mother, Kathie Jamieson Palmer has offered to cover some of the cost associated with landscape by the church along Malvern Lane.

A survey will be administered asking congregants questions about the Jazz Worship.

The session elders received a handout "Worship Gifts of God"; this is a study guide from the PCUSA for the sacrament of communion. The handout is also on the table in the Narthex.

### **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY Bountiful Basket Garden**

On March 30, volunteers Jim Holler and Dan Ortgessen tilled the ground in preparation for the Bountiful Basket Garden's 5th year of providing fresh produce to low-income residents and those in need. On the same day, a small, but dedicated group of volunteers wasted no time in planting 230 seed potatoes. Once again, community businesses have stepped up to help: Harold Humphres at R&H has donated seed potatoes, plus seed packets for various vegetables, and onion sets to be planted this spring. Seaney Farms has agreed to provide the pepper and tomato plants; the Holliday family farm has provided bales of straw to be used as mulch, and to protect the plants; the PORTA school district continues to provide the gardening space. Without the generosity and support of these local enterprises, the story of the Bountiful Basket would be quite different.

The garden's success over the last 4 years is an example of what can happen when civic-minded people work together. In the 4 years of its existence, the Bountiful Basket Garden has produced and distributed a total of 16,570 pounds of fresh produce to over 4,868 residents. Talk about much being accomplished by a few!!

With nature's help, 8 board members and volunteers will once again provide healthy, fresh vegetables from a small plot of ground. New volunteers are needed for the garden to continue serving the community.

Volunteers for the garden are primarily needed on Tuesday and/or Thursday mornings. Each day's work is usually accomplished in less than 2 hours; however, it is not necessary for volunteers to stay the entire time. Any amount of time devoted to the garden will be appreciated. Help is needed in preparing the ground, planting, harvesting, and fall clean-up. No experience is required! Aside from working in the garden, there are less physical, but important ways to be a part of the Bountiful Basket Garden mission. Vegetables need to be weighed, recorded, and then distributed at the Food Pantry in front of the Presbyterian Church. Please consider how much time you can commit to helping others in our community. If not you, then who?
