The popular and commercial presentation of the Christmas season has so eclipsed what the coming of the Messiah means to the Church and to our faith that it is helpful to re-examine and reflect on this season of expectation and the life of faith.

To quote Evelyn Underhill, "God is always coming to us in the sacrament of the present moment. Meet and receive Him there with gratitude in that sacrament.: Yes, God is always coming to us in the present, but we are not always present, awake, or expectant.

God has "come into the neighborhood in Jesus the Messiah" (Peterson translation) and lives among us.

Advent is the time we set aside to pay attention, waiting expectantly and awake to receive our Lord.

Please join the discussion as we reflect on the mean-

ing of "The Wonderful Counselor," "The Mighty God," "Everlasting Father," and "Prince of Peace" in an adult study by Walter Brueggemann. Most important will be your insights and reflections. "Let us reason together!"

This four-week Bible study, "Names of the Messiah," will begin on November 27. It will be led by Brooks McDaniel at 9 a.m. in the Parlor.

FUTURE IBEN SERIES EVENTS

In this November issue of the Window, we are going to highlight the next two events of the series which happen in December! With so many wonderful treats in store for December, we decided we might take the month of November off so our musical forces can adequately prepare for the full-blown Christmas celebration we plan in December.

The first of the December events is actually a regular church service, with one difference, there will be no sermon! Well, the sermon will be musical instead of spoken. Our Book of Order specifically allows and encourages that the Word be presented in various ways on occasion. So we are diving in with enthusiasm.

WELCOME ALL WONDERS



On Sunday morning, December 4, at the ten o'clock service, a small Chamber Ensemble drawn from the full choir will present a lovely Christmas Cantata: "Welcome All Wonders." The composer, Richard Shephard, has had a

long association with York Minster in northern England, serving as everything from composer in residence to Director of Development for the Minster and many other jobs in between. During the entire 40-year association, Shephard continues to create music for the Minster Choir. This particular work was a commission from Pine Street Church in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, where Tom Clark-Jones served for seventeen years. It was a major work commissioned in honor of Tom's predecessor at Pine Street, who served there for 43 years! It was warmly received by all and in our work together with the score here in Peoria, we have also come to appreciate this lovely work.

Just because it was written in 2005 does not mean it is dissonant and unlistenable! To the contrary, Shephard builds on the wonderful nineteenth and early twentieth century tradition of romanticism with great lyric lines setting magnificent poetry. It is accompanied by a small instrumental ensemble and organ and has a major baritone solo role, which will be sung by Steve Williams, who has been a guest with the choir several times before. Plan to come and bring your friends for this special work. Our usual service of Communion for the first Sunday of December will be observed, and we have good plans to have everyone at coffee hour by eleven o'clock! Come and start your Advent/Christmas season with us.



THE FESTIVAL OF NINE LESSONS AND CAROLS will take place on the second Sunday of December, the eleventh, at four in the afternoon. The Choir and Hand Bell Choir will present this historic service whose roots are deep in King's College, Cambridge, England, and whose celebration has spread across the English-speaking world. There will be more details about this in the December issue of the Window. There will be a meal following this event at 5:30 p.m. There will be a charge for the

meal, but not the service, of course. Watch the weekly bulletin for details of the meal and also next month's edition of the Window.



were fed. For over thirty years, those who visited Loaves & Fishes could only come once every sixty days. When the recession was going on in 2008, the Loaves & Fishes Board of Directors voted to decrease the wait between visits from sixty days to thirty days. During a time of extreme economic hardship in this country, this was very beneficial for thousands of people. In 2012 during the "height of the recession," 125,000 hungry people were fed. Over 70,000 people were fed in 2015. Almost half of these individuals were children. Currently, there are twenty different locations throughout Mecklenburg County, NC. Several of them are at Presbyterian Churches. Loaves & Fishes is one of the most successful food pantries in the United States.

AUTUMN IS HERE AND SO IS THE TIME WE FALL BACK - NOVEMBER 6

Set your clocks back one hour and enjoy some extra sleep or use that time to do your semi-annual chores. It's easy to forget regular home maintenance checks. But make them a part of your time-changing routine, and you can help protect your family and house from a host of preventable problems. Here are a few tips of things to check around your home while you're switching your clocks and smoke alarm batteries.

A SAFETY CHECKLIST FOR DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

☐ Replace batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide dete	JC.
tors. Then test each detector according to the maker's instrutions.	JC-

☐ Replace batteries in your flashlights. The last thing you want if

the power goes out is a dead flashlight. Also, do this for any weather alert radios you may have.
☐ Flip the mattresses in the Fall and Spin/Flip the mattresses in the Spring.
☐ Give light fixtures some attention. Remove light globes and clean them to remove dust and bugs. Also consider replacing incandescent bulbs with more energy-efficient compact fluorescent lights (CFLs).
□ Close off unused rooms. It could help save money on heating costs during winter and air conditioning costs in the summer. Energy.gov suggests keeping the rooms at least 55 degrees F, though, to prevent any pipes from freezing.
☐ Check your meds. Get rid of expired medicines — but before you throw them in the trash, research safe, responsible disposal methods for each medication. Restock basic over-the-counter items like cough syrups, decongestants, antihistamines, and fever and pain reducers.
☐ Whip appliances into shape. Get the best performance from your kitchen appliances by cleaning them according to the manufacturer's directions. Spot problems by using inexpensive oven and fridge/freezer thermometers to check temps.
\square Check your pantry for any expired foods.
$\hfill \Box$ Clean out your dryer duct for any lint that has accumulated.
$\hfill\Box$ Change the baking soda in the refrigerator and freezer.
☐ Change your water filters.
☐ Check your furnace filter. Energy.gov states that a clogged air filter can restrict airflow and increase energy consumption between 5 and 15 percent. Depending on

the type of filter your furnace uses, clean or replace it now - and at least one to

☐ Reprogram your thermostat. Be sure to change it from summer to winter settings before you turn the heat on, and

- ☐ Remove debris from gutters and downspouts.
- ☐ Have your chimney inspected and cleaned.
- ☐ Check for cracks in doors and windows. Use caulk or insulation stripping to seal any gaps you find.
- ☐ Drain your garden hoses and store them away.
- ☐ Check the expiration date on your fire extinguishers. If it's past its time, research the proper way to dispose of it and pick a new one up pronto.
- ☐ If you have a programmable home security system (say, the motion detectors are only on while you're at work) make sure you not only update the time, but check your programs to make sure they're still applicable as we head towards warmer weather.
- □ Lastly, double-check your door locks. The winter weather may have taken a toll on them, causing the locking mechanisms to jam up, handles to become loose, or keys to corrode or rust. While you're outside, check your exterior lights and replace any bulbs that are dimming or have burned out.

Follow this list and you'll not only make sure your home and family are safe and sound, but you'll be just a few steps closer to being prepared for that long -awaited spring and summer weather. And, don't forget to turn your clocks back one hour before you go to bed Saturday night.

VETERANS DAY

The church office will be closed in observance of Veterans Day.



Did you know, World War I – known at the time as "The Great War" - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France? However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the

reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

So on this day, November 11, be sure to thank a veteran for the freedom they fight and defend and also their family, for the sacrifices they have made.

REMEMBER TO EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON NOVEMBER 8

The polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Each voter must vote at his/her precinct polling place. Check your polling place location with the election authority (country clerk or board of election commissioners) for your jurisdiction.

Prior to Election Day, voters should familiarize themselves with their voting rights and related voter information.

Each jurisdiction selects a voting system from among the systems that have been tested and certified for use in Illinois by the State Board of Elections. Each voter is entitled to receive instruction on the use of the voting equipment. Disabled voters may receive assistance in voting either from the election judges or from a person of the voter's choice.

Voters whose registrations are active at their residence will receive a full ballot which includes all offices and public requests applicable to that address. Voters who have moved and not updated their registration record should check with their election authority (county clerk or board of election commissioners) to determine what ballot they may receive on Election Day.

If a voter's name doesn't appear on the official voter list or if his/ her vote is successfully challenged, he/she may cast a provisional ballot. A voter who casts a provisional ballot may check the status of that ballot to determine whether it was tabulated.

Candidates, political parties and civic organizations are entitled to appoint pollwatchers to observe the conduct of procedures in the polling place. Voters also play a key role in helping guarantee fair elections by reporting fraudulent activities in or near the polling place.


PLAYGROUND GETS NEW MULCH

- Received a thank you from Kemmerer Village for our \$360 gift.
- Three members have accepted the call as deacons.
- In the Presbytery, one church was dismissed from the rolls. That was Summerville in Medora, Illinois.
- The session received from Gary and Jan Leonard the list of suggestion other purposes and uses for the O'Neill Parish House.
- Rev. Clark-Jones gave a tour of O'Neill Parish House to city Councilman Sid Ruckriegel.
- Retired Presbyterian Ministers Gary Davis and John Nixon have prepared a lecture of Jesus and the Koran. This is scheduled for Saturday, October 29.
- At the Saturday, October 29, Jesus and the Koran event there will be a Mediterranean luncheon.
- The session approved moving the balance sheet accounts for the food pantry to the Development Fund as restricted accounts.
- The food pantry served 1,127 in September.

- Mulch has been ordered for the playground at a cost just over \$2,500.
- The fall clean-up is scheduled for November 5, and the rain date is November 12.
