DISCIPLESHIP

We received our annual stewardship letter from Pastor Denise last week. It's fundraising season at Westminster. This year's theme is discipleship. Why discipleship? THERE IS NOTHING SAD ABOUT A BLUE ADVENT Pastor Denise Clark-Jones

Perhaps by the time you read this article, you will have seen the new Advent paraments in the sanctuary. As I am writing, I am waiting in expectation, which is the definitive mood of Advent as we celebrate it in our own place and time. I have not seen the paraments, but I have seen the weaver's work as have you. The woven paraments in our sanctuary were done by the same artist, Suzanne Halverson, many years ago.

Halverson has worked as a textile studio artist in Indiana since the 1970's. Her studio is in Monroe County. She has been a visiting lecturer at Indiana University, Earlham College, and Purdue University. She has taught weaving workshops at many conferences, including PCUSA's retreat center, Ghost Ranch, in New Mexico. She particularly delights in creating unique clerical vestments, church paraments and textile art for worship spaces.

"My art is my spiritual evolution. Weaving is my true north and without it I don't know who I would be — I consider it my calling. It keeps me seeing the world as a hopeful place. I look for beauty and inspiration every day...Weaving is what I call active meditation. Every step of the process is slow and intentional." "Suzanne Halvorson

Finding the weaver who did some of the pieces of our current paraments was not easy. It has been so long that I could not find anyone who knew the artists involved. I asked many people, and by chance, Brooks McDaniel mentioned my search to his wife, Linda, who is also a weaver — another fact I did not know! It turns out that more than one artist was involved in creating the Westminster sanctuary paraments. Linda McDaniel remembered Halverson and knew how to get in touch with her. Suellen Kirkwood, the elder who heads the Worship committee, got in touch with Halverson and commissioned her to create blue Advent paraments for Westminster. Joyce Hakes also took part in the conversations with Halverson about the project.

So, as I am writing, I am waiting in joyful anticipation of seeing these new paraments in Westminster's sanctuary on the first Sunday of Advent.

Why have special paraments for the Advent season?

Why not just use the purple ones that are also used for Lent? It seems appropriate to me because we no longer observe Advent as a penitential season as it was in the Early Church. Until the 4th century white was the only color used for clerical vestments and church paraments. The assigning of different colors for the various seasons and special days of the Christian calendar gradually evolved, but with variations based on availability of natural dyes and different worship practices. Remember, we did not always have the easy communication between people living in different locations that we do now. In the Christian countries, mostly European, there were not standard colors that every geographic location used.

For much of our Christian history, Advent was observed as a penitential season just like Lent. However, over time Advent has taken on an emphasis of hope and expectation and it has become less of a time of penitence. With the 20th century liturgical renewal movement, churches have looked back at early Christian worship practices and reclaimed valuable ones that have been lost. This movement has also initiated looking at the inclusion of new worship practices. More and more Protestant churches are adding blue paraments for Advent. Since my previous church used blue for Advent, I already have a blue stole, so no extra cost for that!

The tradition of using blue for Advent became established at the Salisbury Cathedral in England during the 13th century. The use of blue instead of purple for Lent and Advent was not new. In some locations it was difficult to obtain purple dye, so indigo was used.

Quoting my husband Tom's bulletin notes:

"This ancient Cathedral early on decided not to be quite so solemn about preparations for Christmas and in our modern world, where we spend so much time in secular preparation for Christmas, this seems a fitting change."

One can see from the lectionary texts for Advent that the first two weeks of Advent, the theme of judgment is present. Although we hear John the Baptist's warning that the Day of Judgment is coming and we need to repent, by the third week the mood becomes one of joyous expectation with the good tidings to Mary that she will bear the Messiah who will bring salvation. Even John the Baptist's dire warning is softened by the knowledge we have that the One who will be our Judge is Jesus. We know that the One who came that we might repent of our sins and live in the path of righteousness is the One who has showed us the path and forgives us of our sins.

I don't know about you, but I am feeling a strong need this year for the hope, joy, peace and love that welcoming Christ into our lives can bring. I am ready to take on a new "shade" of Advent from the purple of the penitential season of Lent.

I have read from several sources that deep blue is the color of the sky before the dawn brings the rise of the sun in the east. In using blue for Advent, we highlight the hope-filled and steadfast focus of watching for the light of Christ day by day. Repentance is still a resounding message during Advent. Christ, who is always coming, moves us to the honest self-examination necessary for repentance and transformation – the Lenten purple in our spiritual lives. During Advent let us also add the hopeful anticipation of the pre-dawn blue.

Let us be joyful!

May the joyful expectation of Advent encourage and enliven your faith!

ADVENT WEAVINGS FOR WESTMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

It is an honor to be commissioned to once again design and weave paraments for your church. This set includes a banner, altar and lecturn hangings, and a book-mark. They are different from the other banners that I have woven for you in the past, although some of the elements are the same.

They feature my signature double weave technique that allows me to weave two layers simultaneously. The background is a traditional sapphire color that symbolizes the Virgin Mary. The golden yellow in the center of the piece symbolizes the color of Christ. White symbolizes the color of Christmas and the purity of the Baby Jesus. I enjoy adding metallic threads to catch the light.

The format for the Banner and Altar hangings is a tryptic. There are three woven panels that are hung side by side to create one piece. They create a subtle cross form that is intended to symbolize the Star of Bethlehem.

HUNGRY BULLETIN Ashley Foster

The holiday season is upon us once again. For most people, this typically involves at least a few holiday parties with family, friends, and/or coworkers. Such parties usually include "grand feasts." Also, just like every year, a great deal of the food at holiday parties does not get eaten and ends up going to waste. According to a study that was conducted by Duke University, "the average person generates 4.3 pounds of waste per day." This number rises significantly during the holidays. Between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, "household waste increases by more than 25%." Here are some tips on how you can reduce waste during the holidays:

- * Make a shopping list. Think of how much food is actually required to feed all of your guests. Then you will only buy what you really need. Sticking to the list will also help avoid impulse buying.
- * Keep serving sizes small. For a lot of us, our eyes are bigger than our stomachs. You can always go back for a second helping if it is not enough.
- * Store leftovers properly. Use airtight containers and freeze whatever does not get eaten within a few days.
- * Put labels with dates on the leftovers you store in your refrigerator. That will make it easier to remember what needs to be eaten first.
- * Look online for recipes that reuse food scraps. There are thousands of them out there.
- * Donate any extra canned or boxed food items to the food pantry here at Westminster.

Keep these tips in mind this holiday season, and you are sure to make a difference!




ADULT VOLUNTEER TUTOR TRAINING WORKSHOP Submitted by Common Place

The popular and commercial presentation of the Christmas season has so eclipsed what the coming of the Messiah means to the Church and to our faith that it is helpful to re-examine and reflect on this

season of expectation and the life of faith.

To quote Evelyn Underhill, "God is always coming to us in the sacrament of the present moment. Meet and receive Him there with gratitude in that sacrament.: Yes, God is always coming to us in the present, but we are not always present, awake, or expectant.

God has "come into the neighborhood in Jesus the Messiah" (Peterson translation) and lives among us.

Advent is the time we set aside to pay attention, waiting expectantly and awake to receive our Lord.

Please join the discussion as we reflect on the meaning of "The Wonderful Counselor," "The Mighty God," "Everlasting Father," and "Prince of Peace" in an adult study by Walter Brueggemann. Most important will be your insights and reflections.
