



HUNGRY BULLETIN

In early September, leaders of the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance organization joined up with leaders from local churches in Houston, Texas, to get an assessment of the damages that occurred as a result of Hurricane Harvey. The leaders gathered together at the Presbytery of the New Covenant in Houston to address a group known as the Presbyterian Youth Connection Council (PYCC).

It was a desire of this group to help with recovery of the damages in Houston and the surrounding areas. According to Reverend Laurie Krause, director of the PDA, "what you do after a disaster response erases the differences in race and faiths. We are all a part of the same human family. Disaster can help transcend those differences." Dickinson, Texas, is one town that was severely impacted by heavy rains. Many homes and businesses in the area suffered a lot of water damage, as well as First Presbyterian Church. A lot of raw meat in their food pantry was ruined. Thankfully, some of the food was salvageable, however. Kathy Seibring, the church's pastor, reported, "We took the damaged canned goods and packages of crackers to the street to be removed by cleanup, yet people were still coming by and taking many of the items home because they were so desperate for food."

The day after the flooding occurred, about 50 members came to the church to help with cleanup and rebuilding, which Seibring had not expected. She was unsure at first whether recovery for the church was even possible and had considered closing the doors for good, but after realizing all the support that she had, she concluded, "God might have other plans for us."

The Gretchen R. Iben Arts Series continues in October with a vocal recital by one of our former soprano choral scholars and soloists, Ashlie Schlatweiler. Ashlie sang in the Westminster Choir off and on through her years at Bradley University, where she was a music major concentrating in vocal performance. In the past three years, she became a regular in the Choir Loft and was the featured soprano soloist in several large works, including John Rutter's "Requiem" and the Vivaldi "Gloria."

A native of Southern Illinois, she came here to study and spent the first part of her career teaching in both Peoria Schools and in the Putnam County Schools. In addition, she had an active private teaching studio where she taught both voice and piano. In August of 2017 she relocated to New Orleans, Louisiana, where she is teaching in another private studio, and intends to further her education.

In her recital, here at Westminster on Friday, October 27 at seven-thirty, she will present solos from Handel, Mozart, Puccini, Schubert, Richard Strauss and Aaron Copland among others. She will sing one duet, the famous duet from the opera "Lakme" by Leo Delibes.

Ashlie's accompanist for the program will be Kari Capps, a collaborative pianist, organist, and music educator from Peoria. She holds a Master of Music degree in Collaborative Piano from Illinois State University and a Bachelor of Science from Bradley University. Currently, she is the junior high choir director at St. Patrick School in Washington, IL and plays piano and organ at the Universalist Unitarian Church of Peoria.

These three extremely talented young women will present a wonderful evening of enjoyable music ... many pieces you may not recognize by their formal titles, but will immediately recognize the great melodies. REFORMATION SUNDAY, THE 500th ANNIVERSARY

This month we will celebrate on Reformation Sunday the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. I will have to admit I was far more excited in 2009 when the 500th anniversary of John Calvin's birth was celebrated than this year when the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's nailing of his 95 theses on the door of Wittenberg Church door will be observed. If you are a Roman Catholic, you would probably find it very fitting that the day was Oct.31, 1517. It was Halloween, when all sorts of devils and hobgoblins were believed to rise from their graves to haunt the living. For the Roman Church, this must seem as a commentary on the celebrating of Martin Luther's contributions to the Protestant Reformation. For a Presbyterian, John Calvin is seen as our theological forefather, even though he and Martin Luther were very much in agreement.

I enjoyed the Calvin anniversary in 2009 because many new books about Calvin came out. I was somewhat of a Calvin nerd in seminary. Although Calvin's complete work, "Institutes of the Christian Religion," (not the abridged version) was once required reading of all who passed through Reformed seminaries, by the time I went to seminary it was not required. With the guidance of my theology professor, I read and discussed the complete work in an "independent study." Calvin has been greatly misquoted and misinterpreted for centuries; and often what people describe as "Calvinism" bears little resemblance to his actual theology.

But, Martin Luther is credited with being the founder of the Protestant Reformation, although it was actually a long formation process which began before he was even born. So to say that the Protestant Reformation occurred 500 years ago is not accurate. The nailing of the 95 theses was a dramatic event. Today, it would have been splashed across the headlines of newspapers, televised, Facebooked, and Twittered. Luther was a dynamic, strong, and engaging personality. His dramatic presentation of his arguments against the Roman Church of the time captured the imaginations of the people in such a way that Luther has always gotten top-billing among the many Protestant Reformers.

John Calvin and Martin Luther never met and had little correspondence. Although both could write in Latin, they preferred to write in their native tongues — Luther in German and Calvin in French - so what they knew of each other's writings was limited. They were also from different generations. John Calvin was only 8 years old when Luther, a middle-aged man, nailed the famous 95 theses to the chapel door. By the time John Calvin was becoming a major figure in the young Protestant Church, Martin Luther was nearing the end of his life. Martin Luther never intended to break with the Roman Church, only reform it. By the time Calvin, a pastor, biblical scholar and theologian, became a leading voice in the Reformed Church, the split with the Roman Church had already occurred.

Today, the Presbyterian Church, USA is in "complete communion" with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the original denomination that is the largest of the Lutheran denominations. The Missouri Synod and the Wisconsin Synod Lutherans broke away from the ELCA and are as different from ELCA as the PCUSA is from the PCA (The Presbyterian Church in America) and other groups that split from the "mother church." When I speak of the "Lutheran" church, I am referring to the ELCA.

Just as Luther and Calvin were very much in agreement, there is very little difference in the basic theology of the Lutheran and Presbyterian Church today. If you go to a Lutheran church service, the primary difference you will


notice is that the service liturgy comes from a Prayer Book. Thus, as with the Episcopal Church, the liturgy follows the lectionary and is always the same for each liturgical day. For example, if it is the fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost in Year A, the liturgy in the service will be the same as the last fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost three years earlier. Presbyterian pastors are free to create or use new liturgy for each Sunday.

Lutherans have always celebrated Communion at every worship service, while, until a few decades ago, Presbyterians usually only celebrated Communion once a month. With the liturgical renewal movement of the 1970's, the Presbyterian Book of Order now states that if Communion is not celebrated at every worship service, it should be celebrated fre-

quently. Calvin himself traveled from church to church in Geneva so that he could receive Communion at every worship service. The words used to describe how Christ is present at Communion, both the Lutheran and Presbyterian understanding, are much the same -- the bread and wine are not the physical body and blood of Christ as Roman Catholics believe, but Christ is spiritually present. For both Lutherans and Presbyterians (as well as other Episcopalians and other Reformed denominations) Christ's presence in the celebration of the Lord's Supper is one of the "mysteries of our faith."

My appreciation of the "500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation" is particularly enhanced by the thesis of Phyllis Tickle, champion of "Emergent Christianity." In her first book on the subject, "Emergent Christianity," she starts the book by noting that significant changes occur, roughly, every five hundred years. The pattern begins with the coming of Christ in the first century, the era of the consolidation of the church under Gregory in the fifth and sixth centuries, the Great Schism of the 11th century, and the Reformation of the 16th century. From this historical trend, Tickle proposes that, in the 2000s, we're poised for another major transformation of the Church. What will happen in the

next 500 years? Grounded in this time and place, we are very limited in the realities of the future, even though our actions now will affect what happens in the future. We are trying to follow Jesus, but Jesus understood that God's plan and the work of the Holy Spirit determine how we will come to an understanding of how to follow him in our own time and place.



ture. Church doctrine which could not be supported by Scripture was rendered null and void.

Sadly, today we know that Protestants of the Reformed tradition are woefully ignorant of the Bible, particularly those who claim to be active church members. In the process of creating new Christian communities of faith, "church starts," the first step of organization is not a church building, but bible study in public places or homes. Jokingly, we refer to the bible as "the greatest book never read." If celebrating the Protestant Reformation beginning on October 31, 2017, encourages more people to enjoy the freedoms the Protestant Reformation won — a bible written in their own native tongue, pursuit of biblical scholarship, and a return to the ways and means of Jesus Christ in the world — bring it on!

Phyllis Trible called the 500-year phenomenon of change "the Church's 500 Year Rummage Sale." The question that challenges the Church today is what to throw out and what to keep? The Protestant Reformation guides us to pay more attention to the Bible and less to cultural trends. Who knows where the Spirit will lead in the future? But, God's Word stands forever.







- 1) The Presbytery of Great Rivers has called a special meeting to approve the job description for the interim executive presbyter, bridge consultant, to be held on September 19
- 2) The session personnel chair position is now vacant.
- 3) For this year the Lectionary Bible Study will be held bi-weekly on alternate Thursdays at 1:30 PM, in the Parlor.
- 4) The Session received and accepted a proposal for new vinyl flooring for the Fellowship Hall for a cost not to exceed \$14,000.
- 5) As of November 1, our custodian, Pat Flynn, will be retiring. A replacement will need to be hired.
- 6) One of the three A/C units in the Fellowship Hall has been modified to improve air circulation and reduce noise. After a trial period evaluating the effectiveness of that unit, the other two units may be modified.
- 7) The water heater in the Parish House has been replaced.
- 8) The WestMark Food Pantry served 2057 people in July and 1486 in August.
- 9) Peoria Head Start lost its space in Valeska Hinton and looked at Westminster as an alternative location.
- 10) Kindermusik is considering leasing space from Westminster. This is an early age toddler and preschool program introducing kids to music and would amount to about six hours per week.
