

when the nation of Israel was formed as a Jewish homeland. But conflicts have raged in the Middle East for 3,000 years of recorded history.

Dr. John Nixon, who visited the area now referred to as Palestine, will offer a presentation on his travels there on January 21 in the Fellowship Hall after our morning worship service. Many of you will remember Dr. Nixon as one of the two presenters for our seminar on Islam in the fall of 2016.

Going further into the issues facing reconciliation efforts between Israel and her Arab neighbors, Dr. Michael Gizzi from Illinois State University will be here at 11:15 Sunday, Feb. 4, to give a talk on Arab-Israeli peace initiatives. In 2014, the Presbytery of Great Rivers established a Visioning Council to promote Presbyterian, Jewish, and, Muslim dialogue in communities throughout the presbytery. Dr. Gizzi is the moderator of the Council, which has cosponsored events with inter-faith partners, brought speakers in to address issues of mutual concern, and develop service projects bringing people together across faith lines and developed service projects bringing people together across faith lines.

One of the missions that Westminster contributes to is Neighborhood House. Located on Matthew Street on Peoria's south side, Neighborhood House has been in existence for 120 years. During that time multiple generations have ensured its success by sharing their gifts: financial support, volunteering, or providing expertise in certain areas.

Neighborhood House offers several ongoing programs and services, including: 1) Meals on Wheels, 2) childcare, 3) a food, formula and diaper pantry, 4) summer meals, 5) Sunday meals, 6) snack packs for children, a toy shop, and 7) Santa for Seniors. In addition there are many special events throughout the year to help with fundraising – Tee off Fore Charity Golf Outing, a charity soccer tournament, Rockin' the House dance competition, a 5K run and fun run, and a culinary competition. 744 volunteers donated their time and talents in 2016 for 4,750 hours of service.



From the December 12 Meeting



The church received a thank you note from Neighborhood House for our gift of \$250.

Approved a letter of transfer for Steve and Ann Trower to Stanwood United Methodist Church in Stanwood, Washington.

Rev. Clark Jones continues to meet with the Peoria Clergy Racial Reconciliation group.

The food pantry served 1,806 people in November. WICC has outsourced book keeping functions to Ramsey and Associates.

WICC received \$480 from the Bergner's Community Days coupon book sales.

Over \$600 was raised for WICC from the Make It-Take It sale. Commercial Grounds Maintenance (CGM) is contracted for snow removal for church parking lots.

Exhaust filters for the hoods over the stoves in the kitchen have been ordered. The expense is \$530. The insurance company suggested this modification to us to bring us up to code.

Peoria Public Schools is interested in expanding the Wrap Around after school program and is evaluating the Parish House as a potential site.

THE MEANING OF EPIPHANY

Epiphany begins on January 6 each year. It gets its name from the Greek word epiphaneia, meaning "to appear, to show or to manifest." The ending date of the Epiphany season is determined by Ash Wednesday, which is determined by the date of Easter. Traditionally, Epiphany Day marks the coming of the Magi to worship the infant Jesus. The significance of Epiphany for Christians is that it symbolizes the first recognition of Christ by non-Jews. The season of Epiphany emphasizes the divine nature of Jesus a truth that justifies his perfection as the model of real life. The color of Epiphany is green to symbolize life, growth, hope and eternity, which are all characteristics of the Epiphany emphasis.

According to Marlysa Gamblin Margot Nitschke, coauthors of the article "Getting to Zero Hunger by 2030," putting an end to hunger here in the United States is within our grasp. In order to eliminate hunger completely, we must be able to identify the people who are the most likely to be hungrv. There are a number of different groups of people who are more likely to be hungry than others. Military veterans are one of these groups. More than 1.4 million veterans are living at poverty level. Adults who have disabilities are twice as likely to live with poverty and hunger than those who do not have disabilities. Older Americans, women, and children have higher risks of hunger than men and younger Americans. One of the biggest obstacles to achieving zero hunger is that there is racial inequality in the high hunger and poverty rates among communities of color. For example, schools that are 90% white spend \$773 more per student than schools that are 90% minority. This definitely needs to change. We need to work together to tackle these inequalities in communities, work places and schools.
