I'm sure that most of you who grew up in Peoria can remember your Catholic friends asking one another as Ash Wednesday approached, 'So – what are you giving up for Lent?' Having grown up in Raleigh and Lynchburg, it was not a common question I heard, but my husband, Tom, knew it well having come from an area just as majority Roman Catholic as Peoria. I'm told the usual answer was either 'candy' or, heavens forbid – *chocolate!*

As schoolchildren, most of those asking these questions did not really know what was being asked of them. It was just an inconvenience one had to endure until Easter when the Easter baskets overflowed with all the candy you didn't eat during Lent. Entry from February 14, 2018 Sydney:

The pacific harmony choir was on deck nine by the pool at 5:30 am in their bathrobes to serenade our entrance into Sydney Harbor. I got up in time to be dressed and up there to hear them. It was still dark and there were lights on the peaks of the opera house as we cruised by. Bill had gotten up and was dressed and ready for breakfast when I came back down. We ate in the Panorama Lounge since we had to be in the Cabaret Lounge at 8 am for our tour. Miguel, one of the waiters, took a picture of me on the stern with the opera house in the background.

The tour was slow getting off and we had to go through immigration and customs but that went fine and our bus was right there waiting for us. A number on our bus had mobility issues (worse than us) so we got off a bit late for our tour. Peter was our guide. We had docked right at "the Rocks". This is the area that the convicts built when they arrived in 1788. It is very hilly with narrow streets hewn out of rock. I remembered that part of this city from our visit in 2005. The old Warehouses and piers are still there



and very much in use. Some of those convicts had been sentenced to 7 years for crimes such as stealing a loaf of bread or a hairbrush. From there we went by some government buildings on another hillside and into the botanical garden for a look at Mrs. MacQuarie's chair. James MacQuarie was the governor from 1810 to 1821. He planned the city. His wife and her ladies used to go down to a point of land that had a wonderful view of the

harbor. It isn't a chair at all—just a rock. I took a picture of the seaside movie theatre and opera house near the bus since I did not think I had time to walk down to the point to see the rock. I don't think I missed much.

From there we drove up and down hills through many lovely neighborhoods. I did not remember any of this when we were here 12 years ago. Peter said this was very expensive housing—many millions of dollars depending what view of the harbor you got, if any. We drove by the lighthouse and stopped at an area called "The Gap" (picture on page 3). Many folks commit suicide from this point of land. Peter had some interesting stories about a couple of people who saved a lot of folks from committing suicide.

By now it was 90 degrees. We drove back to Bondi Beach and Peter gave us 30 minutes to go to the bathroom, swim and shop. We had to climb over a bridge to get to any of the three and it took us 15 minutes to do that. Bill used the toilet (I had done that earlier on the bus facility which the driver grudgingly opened) while I went through the building to get a look at the Beach. There is a large patio before you get to the start of the beach and I took a picture from there. We made it back to the bus on time. So much for my hoped-for shopping for post cards and souvenirs.

We drove back through some of the neighborhoods to get back to the ship. It was a good tour. Too bad we were too tired to take advantage of all the great stuff right around this dockage. The after dinner show was a group of male singers called the Sydney Cantoria. They were great.

The staff had done a terrific job decorating the ship for Valentines Day. •

PARISH HOUSE UPDATE

If you have been to the Parish House classrooms and the library lately, you will see the results of lots and lots of cleaning out, trying to ready the building for occupancy. At this point, the biggest challenge is to go through the enormous amount of documents, books, ledgers, registers, clippings, and photos that reflect the history of Westminster Church. Thanks to What are you doing for Lent continued from cover . . .

Discipline. And most of us who grew up as Protestants can't quite fathom it either.

The idea behind the practice of 'giving up something for Lent' has its origins in the temptations of Jesus in the desert at the beginning of his ministry, when for forty days he denied himself food and was tempted by Satan several times. Fasting can be a most meaningful, and cleansing experience – and that is exactly what the Roman Church hoped to instill in the faithful – a time of penitence and fasting to bring them closer to Christ and consider the direction of their lives.

We in the Reformed faith have not often observed this practice. It seemed to the protestant reformers to be a bit foolish – like many things we abandoned when we separated from the Roman Church. However, sometimes we threw out the baby with the bathwater. There were some very meaningful rituals we abandoned for fear that they might be "Roman Catholic."

The basic concept of self-examination and fasting is not a bad idea at all. It has many positive aspects. However, I would suggest that it would be more meaningful for all if instead of 'giving up', we did something positive and productive during Lent. Taking on a Lenten Discipline can be most meaningful. Now what might that be? I would hope it would be something that would bring you closer to God and your faith. Each person has to find something for him or herself that will stretch their spiritual muscles and be of service to the community or the church.

One might take on a promise to attend each service during Lent – including Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and then Easter, of course! In following Lent through from beginning to end, you might find a special blessing. Or, you might decide to read through a book of the Bible. I suggest reading Mark's gospel. This is the gospel featured in our lectionary this Christian year. It was the

earliest gospel written; and, it is the shortest! Or, perhaps you might take ten minutes of each day during Lent and pray for Westminster and its ministry and the new directions God might be calling us to follow. Maybe finding a book on a meaningful subject and reading it through a couple times to really devour its blessings. Or finding someone who is not able to get to church on their own and offer to pick them up

and bring them to church during Lent. Or, coming to serve in our Food Pantry. Or, putting aside the amount of money you spend on coffee at a Starbucks or your favorite fast food store each week and giving it to a worthy mission. There are so many possibilities, and all are worthy. You just need to find the one that will be most meaningful for you.

A personal example from our family life that was most meaningful and unexpected: When our son, Will, was in elementary school, he attended St. Stephen's Episcopal School in Harrisburg. The school was not wildly religious in nature, but they did have chapel every week; and, as Lent approached the priest who was the chaplain for the school did a presentation on Lenten Discipline. On the way home, Will told Tom that he was going to give up Pokémon for Lent. Wow! Will was the world's greatest Pokémon collector and game player. He loved this complicated game that neither Tom nor I understood, but we knew how he loved it. When Ash Wednesday came around, he put his Pokémon cards in his dresser. We figured it would last a few days - but week after week drew on, and Will held to his promise. We would mention from time to time that this was a way to honor God by leaving behind something you truly care about. He followed through all the way to Easter. We were very proud of his sacrifice, and I do believe he understood what he was doing in this exercise.

It was not easy for a seven-year-old to take on this discipline, but he did not complain and was happy to get his game back on Easter. But,

it was his most enjoyable activity and he decided to sacrifice it for Lent. Fortunately, the Episcopal priest also encouraged the children to do something to help others during Lent and his school took on several projects to help the needy. This is the "fast" that the Bible tells us God most desires – to give up some of our time, talent, and resources to help the needy and end injustice or oppression.

I encourage you to find something like Will did and see if it is not a cleansing and uplifting exercise in your spiritual life. When we put aside things like observing Lent as unnecessary, often the blessing we lose is our own. Think of it – and if you have questions about Lenten Disciplines, call me and we'll talk about it over coffee some time. Peace, Pastor Denise †

WESTMINSTER INFANT CARE CENTER FONDLY REMEMBERS MARGE SUTHERLAND

When I heard about Marge Sutherland's passing, I had so many thoughts in my head, as she had always been a legend in my mind. I admired this woman whom I had met only once but had heard so much about over the years at Westminster. I knew she had lived an amazing and full life and had been a founding member of Westminster Infant Care Center (WICC).

Carl Sandburg is quoted as saying, "Nothing happens unless first a dream." Forty-five years ago, in 1973, Westminster Presbyterian Church member Marge Sutherland had a dream to establish a daycare center so that teen parents could complete their high school and/or work training programs. This dream was realized in January 1974 when WICC opened its doors in providing quality, developmentally appropriate care and education for children ages birth to two years old.

We owe Marge a huge debt of gratitude as one of the founding members of WICC. She would be happy to know as WICC approaches its 45th year in 2019 that over one thousand teens and children have been helped since WICC's inception, and we may never know just how much these teens have accomplished in their lives because Marge had a dream...a dream to meet the needs of others in her community. Marge's dream helped others who might not have otherwise had the opportunity to realize their own dreams. She truly "loved her neighbor as herself."

All dreams take many hearts and hands to become realized and we would like to thank all the past and present members of Westminster Presbyterian Church, community agencies, other churches, and members of the neighborhood for serving in the many capacities it took to make WICC a reality. \$\Pi\$

The Presbytery of Great Rivers reported that they are \$72K behind in per capita assessments. This is attributed to small congregations having financial difficulties.

Westminster received a thank you from the Presbyterian Disaster Relief for our gift of \$8,480.

The presentation of the Wrap Around Program by Peoria Public School officials Dr. Sharon Kherat and Derrick Booth was well received at the Moss-Bradley Residents Association meeting on February 4.

The church received a gift of \$998 for the funeral service of Glenn Lawler, a non-member.

The WestMark Food Pantry served 1,106 in January.

The humidifier for the church heating system was replaced at a cost of \$5,280.

Insurance quotes are being solicited from other companies. Discussed church safety procedures recommended by the Brian Asbell, Peoria County Sheriff, anticipating an active shooter in a house of worship. •
