

THE GRETCHEN R. IBEN ARTS SERIES of Westminster Church is pleased to announce a multi-media presentation of Sergei Prokofiev's children's classic, "Peter and the Wolf," on Sunday afternoon, March 24, at three o'clock. The afternoon starts in the Fellowship Hall of the Parish House with art projects for the children to create, and refreshments for all ... including coffee for the adults.

ASH WEDNESDAY BEGINS WEDNESDAY | MARCH 6 | 7 PM

A Service of Imposition of Ashes and Communion Celebrated

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent with a public act of confession and contrition. Acknowledging that all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, we stand in solidarity as fellow creatures before our Creator, acutely aware of our mortality. In the face of our transience, we pledge ourselves anew to live unto God's Word in Jesus Christ, the eternal Word that remains forever.

Historically, Ash Wednesday was a time when penitents were presented for church discipline during Lent, culminating in



reconciliation on Maundy Thursday. Ash Wednesday is also the occasion when would-be disciples of Christ known as catechumens were enrolled in the catechumenate, a special time of learning the basics of the faith in preparation for baptism on Easter Sunday or during the Easter Vigil. In some traditions, Ash Wednesday is a fast day, beginning the Lenten time of fasting and preparation for the Great Three

TAIJI & QI GONG CLASSES COME TO WESTMINSTER

After a slow start due to our Artic Blast of winter weather, Taiji and Qi Gong classes have begun in the Fellowship Hall of the William O'Neill Parish House.

Taiji is an ancient art of meditative movement which originated in China more than 2000 years ago. Today people all over the world practice Taiji and Qi Gong and medical research shows its many benefits. Some of the benefits are increasing vitality, strengthening immune system, reducing anxiety and depression, alleviating stress, increasing breathing capacity, improving balance and coordination, improving circulation, lowering higher blood restoring flexibility, energizing, pressure, providing the lowest impact weightbearing exercises know, and can creating a sense of wellbeing and serenity.

Through the movements we learn to tune in to our bodies. With practice we gather, store, and release and tone to ensure that our energy remains strong and balanced. An important goal is to identify and correct any imbalance as quickly as possible and before a minor problem in one organ or area moves to a more destructive condition. Maintaining a sense of balance, we remain calmer no matter what situation we may encounter.

Each class can be thought of as a 'treatment' session. Progress for each individual will differ based on age and overall health. However, no matter what the personal circumstance, everyone can gain from the practice.

The essence of Taiji is the experience of pure self in motion, in touch, and in harmony with

SPOTLIGHT ON MISSIONS CRITTENTON CENTERS OF PEORIA

This year, Crittenton Centers of Peoria is a new mission that Westminster is supporting. Since 1892 Crittenton Centers have been protecting and nurturing children and families. One of the major initiatives is a crisis nursery. It provides child abuse prevention services for children from birth to six years; through emergency intervention and respite care, crisis counseling, and support services to families facing stress related to domestic violence, parenting challenges, mental health issues, and other situations that put children at risk. In turn, parent stress levels are reduced, parenting skills increased, and children are safe. Family stability is improved while children are in a safe environment.

All services that the Crisis Nursery provides are free to parents residing in Peoria, Tazewell, and Woodford Counties. The services are offered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Children can stay up to 72 hours, depending on the situation. The Centers also offer parent education classes throughout the community and encourage parental participation. Families are frequently referred to community agencies based on individual or family needs.

CELEBRATING 45 YEARS!

This year Westminster Infant Care Center (WICC) is 45 years old. As part of our ongoing series of articles to remember WICC's past, I took the opportunity to speak with WPC member Marge Willadsen about what it was like in 1974 when WICC first opened its doors for teen parents and their children.

Marge said the location of the Infant Care Center was in the lower level of the southeast corner of the old church building. Interestingly, this location is very close to where we are currently located in this building. She remembered that the Board members painted the day-care room to prepare it for operation.

The church held Sunday School class for the kindergarten-age children as well as Vacation Bible School (VBS) during the summer in the Infant Care Center. The toys and equipment were shared by the WICC children and the church children and much care was taken to ensure that they were cleaned and put away each Friday and Sunday.

Marge said that she commuted for 2 years from her home to the daycare via bike, walking, or driving her car. Marge smiled as she recalled a little daycare boy loving her bike that she rode to church. Marge served in many roles for the daycare including being a WICC Board member. But mainly she spent her time cooking for the chil-

dren and would sometimes fill in if the daycare required help in the classroom. She would cook the food in the Parish House kitchen and bring it over to the church building at lunch time. She made lots of soups, as she knew the children needed more vegetables in their diet and that was one way she could make it happen. Once the meals were brought over, volunteers would come and help feed the children. The Director would make up grocery lists and Marge Klise, a

LENT ... ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Beginning on March 6, Ash Wednesday, we will begin the journey that is Lent, the fortyday liturgical season before Easter, excluding Sundays. We exclude Sundays in the 40-day count because every Sabbath Day is a celebration of the Resurrection. During this time, we follow the example of Jesus, who was led by the Spirit to a forty-day retreat into the wilderness just before he began his public ministry. During this time, he practiced the spiritual discipline of fasting, which is an ancient Jewish custom expressing repentance and devotion to God. The practice of fasting has continued in the Christian tradition as part of our Lenten journey which follows Jesus on the road he traveled from Baptism to the Cross.

Sacrifices that are not motivated by our desire to strengthen our relationship with God are not only meaningless sacrifices but can, instead, lead us further from God if those sacrifices are made for our personal gain rather than the kingdom of God. For example, one might give up chocolate or ice cream because it is a temptation to eat too much, with the unwanted consequence of gaining weight. If this sacrifice is for one's benefit alone, it is not a sacrifice for God. According to the Bible, sacrifice is not just an act of contrition, it is also an act demonstrating repentance, changing direction from selffocus to God-focus. The spirit of fasting during Lent is to give up something or to do something we have neglected to do, which is separating us from God.

In the Hebrew Bible (our Old Testament) the prophet Isaiah admonishes the people of Israel for public displays of fasting while continuing to commit sins against their neighbors in need:

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover

them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?" (Is.58:6-7)

Jesus fasted and prayed in order to learn what God was calling him to do and to build the spiritual strength and integrity to accomplish it. Jesus also prayed fervently during his forty days in the wilderness. Prayer is another spiritual discipline which brings us closer to God. Jesus quoted the Isaiah passage to teach his disciples that fasting is adding as well as subtracting. By doing what we have neglected to do to fulfill our call to discipleship, we are sacrificing – sacrificing our time, a precious resource in our society, and resources to help those in need.

Jesus reminded his disciples that fasting, as a spiritual discipline, is not just an act of individual repentance, but also an act of corporate repentance of the sins of our society. Either directly or indirectly, with sins of commission or omission, we have responsibility for societal sins. Jesus explained that how we treat others is how we treat Him. Are we compassionate and generous, indifferent or condemning and denying?

As Jesus went into the wilderness for fasting and prayer after his baptism and call to ministry, we now begin a period of reflection and prayer so that we can learn what it means for us to be Christ's disciples, discover what God is calling us to do, and be graced by God so that we, too, can grow in spiritual strength and integrity.

May God be with you on your Lenten journey! -- Pastor Denise ❖

Your teachers are Donna Sturm, practicing for 12 years, and Terrisa Worsfold with 10 years' experience. They possess experience in several disciplines, including 'Five Moving Forces,' and Circles, Yang 24 Short Form, and Fan form. These are where the bulk of the routines will be drawn. An assortment of shorter Qi Gong movements are done in classes weekly as well.

Donna and Terrisa came to the practice of Taiji as cancer survivors and are convinced that this practice has restored health and hope in their lives. It is for this reason they offer the class to cancer survivors free of charge.

We also want to invite you to come to your first class as our guest. Try it and see if it fits your lifestyle. Classes are \$5 per session.

A class for **beginners** is offered on **Wednesdays** from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. This is the best place to start as a beginner with little or no experience. Movements are done slowly and are cued by the instructors. Soft music is played to help create a peaceful experience.

Our **Monday** class is also offered at 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. This class is a more **advanced** version that has built and expanded from the beginning class. We hope to see you in class! •

TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD Sunday | March 3 | 10 AM

Transfiguration Sunday celebrates the glorious revelation of God in Jesus Christ and Christ's manifestation as the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. Jesus' radiant appearance on the mountaintop evokes the devouring fire of the glory of the LORD at Mount Sinai (Exodus 24.17). Here, as at Jesus' baptism, God claims him as a beloved child, in whom God is well pleased.

In their account of this event, the synoptic gospels offer an enlightening tableau vivant, with Christ flanked by Moses, representing the law, and Elijah, representing the prophetic tradition. With this vivid image, the gospel writers demonstrate the relationship of the human Word of God to the tradition of Israel and set forth the hermeneutic by which they read the Hebrew Scriptures.

HOPE OF THE AGES

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 148-149)

The Sunday immediately prior to Ash Wednesday is an appropriate time to celebrate the Transfiguration of the Lord, because this event marked a transition in Jesus' ministry in which he "set his face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51), where he would die.

In Jesus' transfiguration, we are assured that Jesus is the hope of the ages. Jesus is the One who fulfilled the Law given through Moses, the one dreamed of by the prophets, of whom Elijah is the greatest.

In celebrating this event, we rejoice in the divine majesty of Christ, whose glory shone even when confronted with the cross. It is given us for our journey through Lent toward the agony of the cross and the victory of the empty tomb.

A TIME TO TURN

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 109-110)

The Lenten journey from the ashes of death to resurrected life begins on the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, which signifies a time to turn around, to change directions, to repent. This first day of Lent reminds us that unless we are willing to die to our old selves, we cannot be raised to new life with Christ. The first step of this journey calls us to acknowledge and confront our mortality, individually and corporately. In many traditions, this is symbolized through the imposition of ashes - placing a cross on one's forehead. During the imposition of ashes the words: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19) are repeated again and again. We are to remember that we are but temporary creatures, always on the edge of death. On Ash Wednesday, we begin our Lenten trek through the desert toward Easter.

Ashes on the forehead is a sign of our humanity and a reminder of our mortality. Lent is not a matter of being good, and wearing ashes is not to show off one's faith. The ashes are a reminder to us and our communities of our finite creatureliness. The ashes we wear on our Lenten journey symbolize the dust and broken debris of our lives as well as the reality that eventually each of us will die.

Trusting in the "accomplished fact" of Christ's resurrection, however, we listen for the Word of God in the time-honored stories of the church's Lenten journey. We follow Jesus into the wilderness, resist temptation, fast, and proceed "on the way" to Jerusalem and the cross. Our Lenten journey is one of *metanoia* ("turning around"), of changing directions from self-serving toward the self-giving way of the cross.

An **Ash Wednesday Service** of imposition of ashes and communion will be held Wednesday evening, **March 6**, **at 7:00 PM** in the sanctuary.

A Lenten Invitation to Pray with Art.


