Lent and Easter are determined by a formula that has to do with the cycles of the moon at this time of year. It is possible for Easter to vary by three weeks from year to year. Whenever Easter falls, early or late, Westminster Church on Moss Avenue always marks this holy season with special musical offerings.

This season, we are concentrating on Maundy Thursday (April 18) which is the day upon which Jesus instituted the rite of Holy Communion with his disciples in an upper room. 2019 PER CAPITA APPORTIONMENTGary Leonard

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 Presbyterian congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate, and share in the work of the wider church. It is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly, and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future. As a result, each church is apportioned a share (based on membership) of the expenses incurred by the three higher governing bodies within the PC (USA). For 2019 this apportionment is \$34.22 per member (an increase of \$2.22 from 2018).

I encourage each member to consider a \$34.22 contribution as their share of Westminster's 2019 "Per Capita" payment in support of these judicatories (The Presbytery of Great Rivers -\$21.46, The Synod of Lincoln Trails - \$3.81, and the Office of the General Assembly - \$8.95). As a church, Westminster has pledged \$4,996 to the wider church for our Per Capita share. By contributing at the member level, Westminster avoids using funds that are received from regular offerings and other income for this support of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). A designated envelope for the "per capita" contribution may be found in your box of offering envelopes. If you do not have this envelope, merely indicate "per capita" on your contribution (payable to: "Westminster Presbyterian Church" or just "WPC").

Another option for members is to contribute directly from WPC's website, *wesminsterpeoria.org*.

- On the website, just go to the "Support" page and click on "Westminster's donation portal".
- Then, from the "To" dropdown box, select "2019 Per Capita". (I recently used this online option to contribute the 2019 Per Capita share for Jan and me.)

Contact WPC's Financial Secretary, Denise Wirth at (309) 439-9740, whenever you have a question related to making a financial contribution of any kind to the church.

I sincerely thank you for your consideration of this request. Through March 14, seven members had contributed their share of the 2019 per capita apportionment. In 2018, 68 members of WPC contributed their per capita share.



CELEBRATING 45 YEARS! WICC 45 ANNIVERSARY REVIEW

(1974 – Present)

One ongoing problem for Peoria Public Schools is ABSENTEEISM. Currently the chronic absenteeism is 34%. This lack of attendance and other factors contribute to Peoria Public School's graduation rate of 71%. This problem trickles down to WICC and the situation has continued to get worse in the course of WICC's 45 years of operation.

WICC is doing their best to be a part of the solution to positively impact the student's attendance rate. We do this through our transportation program and our quality early childhood program. Only with a strong support group to motivate, inspire, and encourage teen moms/dads can they get out of bed early enough to attend classes, etc.

In the beginning of WICC (1974) the WICC Board members picked up the teen parent at their house, dropped their child off at WICC and continued the journey to school with a provided return trip. Currently WICC uses the church van and drivers are paid to follow this transportation routine. Even with this provided transportation the parents often ELECT to stay home, which is sad. The choice of improving their future is theirs.

In order to "register" their child into the WICC program, the teen parents has to comply with DCFS requirements, which takes time and effort. Our WICC staff has to encourage, remind, and assist when possible to get everything completed. WICC's goal is to help the teen moms make the right choices. However, even after all this effort and their child is finally in our program, the teen parents often lose interest in rising early enough to care for their child, prepare for school themselves, and be ready when the van arrives....it does require time and maturity...and definitely support.

TAIJI FOR LIFE

We at 'Taiji for Life', or Donna and Terrisa, the instructors, are again thrilled to announce our spring Taiji Workshop. We will celebrate our 20th year of workshops in the Peoria area.

Our event will be held on Saturday and Sunday, April 27 and 28, at Shore Acres Clubhouse in Chillicothe, Illinois. We will again feature Sifu Dan Jones, who will lead us through this exciting weekend. Dan has over 45 years of experience in assorted disciplines of Taiji / Qi Gong and Martial Arts.

With Dan's skills, we will offer an afternoon session on both Saturday and Sunday. This is a Qi Gong called Primordial Qi Gong. The beauty of this is that with the skillful leadership of Sifu Jones, the experienced and the beginner can learn side by side. The moves are repetitive and simple but powerful. This is the beauty of Qi Gong. Read on to see a description of the form.

Primordial Qi Gong

This is one of the most powerful movement ceremonies. It is a rare 800-year lineage Qi Gong with graceful movements. It resembles Taiji but is easier to learn. "Chi" (life force) is gathered from five sacred directions in three beautiful spirals. Each spiral gathers the 12 meridians on the earth 'light' and the 10 celestial rays of heaven Chi into the center of your body. This form puts no stress on the physical body and uses easy weight shifts and balanced movements to activate the energy body.

Regular practice of Primordial Qi Gong can restore and maintain the healthy functions of the internal organs, cultivate and restore the natural balance of energy within the body, and preserve the vitality of youth. Major clinics in China use it to treat many types of chronic diseases, such as heart disease, high blood pressure, weak kidneys and chi deficiency.

We invite you to join us or send any questions our way. It's fun to exercise and learn in a harmonious and peaceful environment. Try it and see. Brochures with registration are available and can be found online. Φ

LIVING IN CHRIST'S PRESENCE

We are living in a time of great anxiety and division. On the world stage old alliances have been broken. Dictators, tyrants, oligarchs and big business have hoarded power and wealth at the expense of their fellow citizens. As climate change affects the Southern Hemisphere with higher temperatures and drought, more migration and conflict occurs due to decreasing arable land. The shifting of populations from the Southern to the Northern Hemisphere to escape starvation and violence has frightened countries in which the majority population was once the white-skinned people of Northern European descent. Deeply embedded bigotry and hate has reemerged in the open. White Nationalists have been emboldened by the lack of resistance they have received, signaling their hateful doctrines are no longer considered abhorrent. Those that have more than they need are desperately afraid they will not have as much of abundance if they share with those that have nothing. Individual and corporate greed has created the greatest wealth disparity this country has ever known.

And then, we dare to celebrate Easter, rejoicing in the resurrection of the One who insisted there was a place at the table for everyone. The words "Christ is risen!" are a clarion call to service, not contempt or neglect, for the sake of the poor and the marginalized of our communities. Jesus Christ offered himself as a sacrifice that we might have reconciliation with God and one another. What we see in the news and social media does not show a community that looks resurrected or redeemed.

The famous 20th century writer and preacher, Frederick Beuchner, wrote:

"Resurrection means that the worst thing is never the last thing. The last thing is the best. It's the power from on high that comes down into the world, that wells up from the rock bottom worst of the world like a hidden spring. Can you believe it? The last, best thing is the laughing deep in the hearts of the saints, sometimes our hearts even. Yes. You are terribly loved and forgiven. Yes. You are healed. All is well." — Frederick Buechner, *The Final Beast*.

Sins of humanity, fear and greed, led to Jesus' conviction of sedition in the Roman Empire. God's love for humanity was the mysterious force that broke through the bonds of death into new life. We do not know exactly how this was accomplished. The New Testament does not give us a lot of information about Christ's resurrection. Beuchner writes:

"It is simply proclaimed as a fact. Christ is risen! In fact, the very existence of the New Testament itself proclaims it. Unless something very real indeed took place on that strange, confused morning, there would be no New Testament, no Church, no Christianity."

Buechner answers those who demand proof of Jesus' body being raised from death with this dismissal:

"It hardly matters how the body of Jesus came to be missing because in the last analysis what convinced the people that he had risen from the dead was not the absence of his corpse but his living presence. And so it has been ever since."

-- Frederick Buechner, *The Faces of Jesus: A Life Story.*

It was Christ's living presence that turned a Pharisee, filled with fear of Christians' defiling his faith and breaking the laws of the Empire, into Paul, the great evangelist and church-starter. It was Christ's living presence that turned Peter, a disciple fearful of even a lone servant girl, from finding out he was a follower of Jesus, into a bold proclaimer of the Good News. It has been Christ's living presence that has inspired people for over two millennia to put aside their fears and self-interest to take on seemingly insurmountable challenges to heal broken places in the world.

When we meet for worship on Easter morning, we will greet one another with the traditional words: "Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed!" We will meet him at the Table where we will share the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper. Then we will be sent out in service, to be healers and reconcilers that others might experience his presence through us.

May Christ's presence sustain and nourish you through the Lenten season and be your joy at Easter!
