If you have not already noticed, you should take a look at the pillars in front of main entrance to the church. They have been resurfaced and painted, and they look much better than they did before. Also, take a moment to look at the work that has been done to the planter near the northeast corner of the Parish House. Unless you have been paying close attention, you may not have noticed how much these two areas needed improvement.

We would like to call your attention to the number of outside organizations that request the use of our facilities. While the Parish House, especially, may seem underused, we often receive inquiries about renting space in our buildings or parking lots. The Session is in the process of deciding who should be allowed to use our facilities and what the cost for that should be.

The Session will purchase two-way radios to be used by the ushers for emergency communications. Also, in the interest of safety, CPR training will be offered again in the near future. Fire and tornado drills have been discussed as a possibility.

An opportunity for Christian Education is being planned to start in September. The details will be available soon.

One thousand ninety-four people were served by the food pantry in the past month.

WATER STEP

Any and all new and used dry shoes, including flip-flops, sandals, tennis shoes, and more can be collected, and they will be donated to WaterStep with several outcomes. The shoes are sold to an exporter, with WaterStep using part of the profits to fund water treatment systems in third-world countries. Of those donated shoes, usable shoes will be sold by local merchants in poorer regions of the world. The funds help these merchants provide a sustainable living for their families. Additionally, recipients of these shoes will be protected from abrasions, parasites and mites in tan-

dem with hundreds of tons in landfill waste being eliminated.
