A New Year

On December 1 we celebrated the new year in the Christian calendar and on January 1 we celebrate the new year of our secular calendar. The word "new" sparkles with enticing possibilities. We associate new with improved because we have heard that phrase so often in advertisements. It seems we human creatures have always been attracted to the new, but also fearful. You will find the word "new" frequently in the New Testament. I checked my concordance and found the word "new" "newness" 54 times.

The Bible begins, in the first chapter of Genesis, with something astoundingly new. In theological terms we say that God created the

world "ex nihilo," meaning "out of nothing." God created the world with newness built into the plan. New growth keeps all that is alive in a cycle of birth, death, and regrowth. So, perhaps it should not have been so surprising that God entered the world with an ultimate plan of salvation with a newborn baby. Yet, he was certainly not the Messiah God's people expected. How could one so vulnerable, so powerless be a Savior? Matthew and Luke tell us that even as an infant, people were drawn to the Christ child - some to worship, some to destroy. When he began his ministry, this unlikely rabbi, a teacher who was believed to be a simple carpenter, the son of

A New Year continued . . .

Mary and Joseph, astounded his audiences with what the gospel of Mark describes as "a new teaching – with authority!" (*Mark 1:27*)

The gospel writers were careful to tell their audiences that the "new" in the "Good News" of Jesus Christ did not come ex nihilo. Jesus was informed by the Hebrew Scriptures he studied all his life. In Matthew, from which will come most of our gospel readings this year, Jesus is portrayed as the new Moses, deemed the greatest prophet of the Hebrew Scriptures, our Old Testament. Like Moses, the Messiah would free God's people from slavery. This time the slavery was sin which separates us from God and one another.

When the Pharisees asked Jesus to name the greatest of the Ten Commandments, he summed up them all with the two-part answer: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." He expressed what was foundational to his faith in a new way. In John's gospel Jesus expresses a similar directive: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34)

Traditionally, we make New Year's resolutions to change something about ourselves or our lives that we believe will make us happier or healthier. What if, instead, we look at our relationship with God and with our sisters and brothers in the world and ask: 'How can I express love for God and neighbor in a new way?' We could start from where we are now in our faith and practice and nurture new growth. We could expand our loving by paying attention to the plight of those less fortunate, the ones about whom the Bible tells us we are to be most concerned and compassionate. What new way can we find to love them? We could grow in our relationships toward those with whom we disagree or judge negatively. Dying to our sins, like selfishness, envy, and hate, allows us to grow in our capacity to love.

One of my favorite quotes is from the legendary cellist Pablo Casals. When asked why he still practiced at age 92, he responded: 'I think I'm finally making progress.'

May this year bring you new growth in peace and love.

The Season of Epiphany

We say we have an "epiphany" when we have an "aha moment" when what was puzzling is suddenly understood. We might also say "I have seen the light!" In ancient times, the word "epiphany," from the Greek "epiphaneia" or "theophaneia," meant either a visible manifestation of a god or the solemn visit of a ruler venerated as a god. ("Companion to the Book of Common Worship," prepared by the Office of Theology and Worship for the Presbyterian Church (USA), Geneva Press, 2003, p.94)

In our Christian calendar we have a Feast of the Epiphany, which traditionally falls after the 12 days of Christmas. The story of the Magi following a star to worship the Christ child represents the revelation of God's promise and purpose to all the nations of the world. We will celebrate the day in worship on Sunday, January 5, rather than the actual day, January 6. The season of Epiphany ends on Ash Wednesday, February 26.

The season is the celebration of God's manifestation or self-revelation to the world in Jesus Christ. The symbolism of light is important in this season of Epiphany. You will notice references to light in our scripture readings, our hymns and choir anthems. With God's self-revelation in Christ, God's Word has appeared to us. 'We who had walked in darkness, have seen a great light.' We are called to be witnesses to God's gift of grace and salvation for all people. We are called to let the light of Christ shine through us in our daily living.
