

THE WORK OF ADVENT

After two snows and some very wintery temperatures in November, I am finding it hard to resist putting up Christmas decorations in my house before Thanksgiving. Tom and I are not even celebrating Christmas at our home this year or even on the day. We will be celebrating on the 26th in Binghamton, NY with our son, Will, who lives there, and our daughter, Jenna, who lives two hours away in Brooklyn, New York. Having the

Lessons and Carols service and the Jazz Christmas service on Dec. 8 and 15, respectively, helps make up for not singing Christmas hymns in church until the 24th for me. It is a sneak preview of the joy to come.

Why do we need a time of waiting? Because in our impatience, we want to skip past the work. The word "liturgy" means "the work of the people." In the wisdom of our Jewish ancestors and early Christian worshipers, we have a liturgical calendar that revolves around seasons of worship. Acknowledging the Christian calendar is an affirmation of our faith.

The Gregorian Calendar we now use came from the original Roman calendar, updated in Julius Caesar's reign (the Julian calendar) and then updated again in the early 16th century to become known as the Gregorian calendar. Thus, the calendar used by most of the world has its roots in the Roman Empire. Jesus was, most definitely, anti-empire. The values he learned from God's Word in the Hebrew Scriptures were in direct conflict with the values of the Roman government and Roman society. Early Christians were persecuted for witnessing that Jesus Christ was their Lord, not Caesar. The historic creeds of the Presbyterian Church all affirm our ultimate allegiance is to Christ over any earthly authorities.

The Book of Worship for the Presbyterian Church (USA) further elaborates on our liturgical calendar:

> As God created and appointed days, God created a rhythm of time and appointed seasons for worship. In the Old Testament, people observed seasons of fasting and feasting as occasions for festival worship of God. Jesus kept these festivals. For the Church in the New Testament, the festivals were transformed in meaning and purpose by Jesus' life and teaching, his death and resurrection, and by the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus' birth, life, death, resurrection, ascension, and promised return give meaning to the seasons which order the annual rhythm of worship and guide the selection of lessons to be read and proclaimed in the life of the Church. (W-1.3013)

And so, in Advent, we focus in our scripture readings on how we are living between the first and the second coming of the Lord. We are suspended between our gratitude for what God has done in the past and the hope for what God will do in the future through our faith in Christ, This is the time we work, as Christ's hands and feet in the world, toward the kingdom of God.

As we read scripture and sing Advent hymns, we are reminded why the world needed a Savior. Yes, there are some grim and challenging scrip-

SESSION NOTES





At its regular monthly meetings your session always discusses the issues that need to be addressed to keep our church operating efficiently and, as the Book of Order would put it, "in good order". Among other agenda items, the meeting this month focused on two things: (1) It is time to start the process of preparing a budget for next year, and (2) The numerous tasks required to maintain our property of which we are all justifiably proud.

The work required to develop a budget falls primarily on the shoulders of the Finance Committee chaired by Elder Gary Leonard, while the task of maintaining our property is the responsibility of the Properties Committee chaired by Elder John Jackson.

We will all see the details of the budget when it is presented at the Annual Congregation Meeting, while the details of property maintenance are less visible. Here are a few maintenance issues that are being addressed right now. Most of these things are probably not on your mind when you attend Sunday Morning services: The humidity in the sanctuary needs to be monitored and controlled, our outdoor lighting needs to be improved, we have a van that has to be maintained, our insurance coverage needs to be kept up-to-date, our

sound system may not be operating as well as it could be. The whole list is pretty long.

We should all appreciate the time and effort that is required for these tasks. We are lucky to have elders and other church members who are able and willing to serve the church in these ways.



HELP REDUCE WASTE DURING THE HOLIDAYS

The holiday season is upon us once again. For most people, this typically involves at least a few holiday parties with family, friends, and/or coworkers. Such parties usually include "grand feasts." Also, just like every year, a great deal of the food at holiday parties does not get eaten and ends up going to waste.

According to a study that was conducted by Duke University, "the average person generates 4.3 pounds of waste per day." This number rises significantly during the holidays. Between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, "household waste increases by more than 25%."

Here are some tips on how you can reduce waste during the holidays:

- * Make a shopping list. Think of how much food is actually required to feed all of your guests. Then you will only buy what you really need. Sticking to the list will also help avoid impulse buying.
- * Keep serving sizes small. For a lot of us, our eyes are bigger than our stomachs. You can always go back for a second helping if it is not enough.
- * Store leftovers properly. Use airtight containers and freeze whatever does not get eaten within a few days.
- * Put labels with dates on the leftovers you store in your refrigerator. That will make it easier to remember what needs to be eaten first.
- * Look online for recipes that reuse food scraps. There are thousands of them out there.
- * Donate any extra canned or boxed food items to the food pantry here at Westminster.

IOIN US IN ADVENT WORSHIP SUNDAYS AT 10AM



While the world around us moves quickly on to the next holiday and beyond, the historic church encourages us to anticipate, celebrate, and then remember special days in the church calendar. Recognizing that Christmas does not end on December 26, we will continue to sing in celebration of the Christmas season which began on Christmas Day and includes the following two Sundays, December 29 and January 5.

Israel waited and hoped for the Christ child. Today we wait for Christ to come again in a world that is still full of sorrow and sin. In this season of waiting and anticipation called Advent, we take time to watch, repent, and prepare so that we may be ready to proclaim the Good News that God has come through Jesus Christ to restore us and all of creation.

The candles lit each week by members of Westminster Presbyterian Church, represent hope, peace, joy, and love and are lit as signs of the coming light of Christ.

- 1. **HOPE** Think about hope as you hear Lamentations 3:21-24 "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. "The Lord is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him."
- 2. For the second week in Advent, we focus on PEACE. In John 14:27, Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."
- **3.** During the third week in Advent, we spend time thinking about **IOY.** From Psalm 5:11, we hear these words, "But let all who take refuge in you rejoice; let them ever sing for joy. Spread your protection over them, so that those who love you name may exult you."
- **4.** In this final week of Advent, our attention is on **LOVE.** Listen for the call to love in these words. Matthew 22:36-40 says, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and intelligence.' This is the most important, the first on any list. But there is a second to set alongside it: 'Love others as well

as you love yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

5. Christmas! This is the day we have been preparing for throughout Advent. JESUS IS BORN!

Join Us for Worship beginning with the First Sunday in Advent Sunday, December 1 at 10:00 AM and ending with Christmas Eve Candlelight Communion Service on Tuesday, December 24 - at 4 PM.

We will light the first candle in the Advent wreath as we begin our worship.

The season of Advent calls us to look with expectation toward the coming of Christ.

Some of this involves a kind of hindsight—we look backward and prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. Each year that birth warms our cold hearts. Each year it brings light to our shadowed world. We need that. We desperately need the warmth and light that we experience in looking backward.

Advent—a word that means "coming'—also challenges us to look forward to the Christ who continues to come into our lives and our world. These days call us to keep awake as we anticipate what ancient people of faith called "the day of the Lord."

In the lead up to Christmas, many of us spend time in search of the perfect gift — the gift that communicates to friends and family how much we know and love them. We search our memories for indications of what gift might cause the faces of our loved ones to light up on Christmas morning. We scour the stores and shops, hoping to come across the thing that will communicate a depth that our words cannot.

Although we cannot give the perfect gift, we can give generously, knowing, as the New Testament letter of James says, "every generous act of giving ... is from above."

For those of us who gather in Advent expectation, we know that the only perfect gift ever given was the one we received in Jesus Christ. The Christmas Joy Offering celebrates the coming of Jesus Christ, the "perfect gift" from a gracious God.

Devoted and caring leaders have led many of us in the way of Christ. Church workers have shaped our faith and they have been God's gifts among us. As we celebrate Christ's coming, and think of the profound impact these individuals have had on us, the Christmas Joy Offering provides a way for us to offer a gift in response.
