ON THE ROAD TO A HOLY LENT

We are now in that part of the Christian liturgical year's cycle in which we follow Jesus' footsteps through the wilderness of introspection. We start the year with the glorious hope of new life as represented by God's infant Son sent to bring salvation to all the world. In the season of Epiphany, marked by scripture, we receive

God's truth shining like a beacon for us to perceive and guide us in our faith journeys. God's glory dazzles us, as it did Peter, James and John, on the mountain of Christ's Transfiguration. But, as Jesus always did after he had been on a mountain to pray and preach, in Lent we come down from the mountain and enter into the world where we do the work of living out our baptisms in a world resistant to God's commandments. We begin, in Lent, by breaking down our own resistance.

In Matthew's gospel, upon which this year's scriptures are focused, the three practices of what would later be called Lent are marked as "prayer, fasting, and almsgiving." In prayer we seek strength and guidance to avoid and climb over the stumbling blocks in our path. In fasting from the temptations that lure us off the course Jesus followed, we free ourselves to follow Him more closely. In works of charity, mercy and justice to those in need, we emulate Christ in the attempt to make our actions become our attitude -- our way of being in the world.

I will delve deeper into the origins of Lent in the three classes offered after the worship service, February 23, March 1, and March 8. I hope you will join me in learning more about the biblical and historical origins of Lent, as well as discerning your own spiritual practices that will encourage your keeping of a holy Lent.



HOW CAN I HELP?

First, keep the food pantry volunteers and clients in your thoughts and prayers.

Second, come help unload deliveries:

The first and third Tuesday, March 3 and 17, at 11:20 a.m.,

Thursday, March 12, at 1 p.m. and the fourth Wednesday, March 25, at 11 a.m.

Third, the food pantry will highlight items that they get requests for or of a greater need. They always can use the basic list of foods like peanut butter, all canned meats, fruits and vegetables, but there is always those specific items that aren't donated as often or at all that are in need. These items are listed in the grocery bag below. Donate what you can, when you can. Items can be placed in the green tubs found in the Narthex on Sunday mornings or during church office hours (Monday - Friday, 8:30a to 2:30p)

Fourth, we also can use some help filling in for our regular volunteers on Monday morning. Please consider being placed on a "substitute" list. There are times



when the food pantry needs an extra helping hand due to illness. vacations. etc. This would be on a very occasional instance that you would be called on. but we still need a list to begin with. If this is something you would be willing to do, please Elizabeth contact Richmond or the church office.

WHAT DO YOU DO?

So many people ask me for an example of what I do as a mu-


sic therapist. Would you believe it if I told you that we spend a considerable amount of time in our training learning just *how* to advocate for our professions with the different people with whom we interact? Over time, we music therapists figure out what is helpful with certain folks, and what is truly wasted energy. One sample we give of music therapy may look NOTHING like the interventions we would design around another client's goals. However, if it's an example you want, an example you will receive!

It was early 2015. I was in the second half of my music therapy internship with MusicWorx Inc. in beautiful San Diego, CA. One of the placements the interns worked was a hospice facility. We'd show up with our guitars on our backs and binders or iPads of music, and we would report to the front desk where we were handed a binder of referrals. The intern team would sit down at a table and pass out the referrals and make sure we were all mindful of referral details like the patient's diagnosis, religious practices, family support, etc. Sometimes a referral would come with the letters "FTT." I kept my eye out for those letters in our referrals. Patients with "FTT" on their paperwork were often some of our most memorable music therapy clients. It stands for "Failure To Thrive." What a loaded phrase. I was handed my referrals for the day and noticed a tiny "FTT" in the notes. *Don't mind if I do*, I thought.

She was older. She appeared to be sleeping. I say "appeared to be," because, as I learned at this internship, there is a difference between being asleep and being nonresponsive. I was getting settled in next to her bed when a nurse passed by. She leaned in the extra wide doorway and said "oh I'm so glad you're seeing her! She will not wake up for food." *That sounds like a goal to me,* I thought. I played my guitar to create a musical environment while I scanned her monitors for helpful information. The nurse popped her head back into the room and said, "by the way, she's very hard of hearing so you'll have to get really close." Noted.

One of my go-to songs in these situations was 'You Are My Sunshine.' So many people know this song, and many older adults have some meaningful connection to it too. I sang into her ear and watched her face and chest for signs of stimulation. Nothing yet. I repeated the tune, this time just on the "ah" vowel so I could project right into her ear. Still nothing. She remained in her peaceful position. I decided to ditch my guitar and hold her hand. I smiled and told her I'd try one more time and would leave her to her rest if she didn't respond. I livened up the tempo of the song, sang the lyrics right into her ear, and bounced our hands together on her lap gently. The song ended. The patient changed nothing, except her hand continued to bounce to the beat despite the fact that I'd already stopped and planned to wrap this up and find my next patient. She was with me! I said her name right into her ear and loudly encour-

Ezekiel 37:1-14 Psalm 130 Romans 8:6-11 John 11:1-45 aged her to open her eyes. "Open your eyes! We're singing You Are My Sunshine! You must be hungry!!"

The patient mumbled something so softly I almost wasn't sure she'd said anything at all. "Say that again" I said loudly into her ear. I waved a nurse in to help me understand and to perhaps start the process of getting her the food she needed. "Water" she said again. The nurses ran around to get the water she requested and to sit her up in her bed. They took right over and showed her the nutritionally reinforced jello they had been trying to get her to wake up to eat.

Music didn't serve as a context for the patient's reflection on her situation, or as a way to create meaningful experiences with family in the time she had left. I didn't have a crystal-clear goal until a nurse popped in and offered me some helpful insight. But I can say with confidence that music and my therapeutic intervention is why she accepted nutrition that day. It is moments like this that make it hard to explain but *so* worth telling. Until next time, Katie.


BECOMING A BELOVED COMMUNITY

A Matthew 25 journey to the cross

The season of Lent has often been a time to give up a vice or an indulgence (did someone say chocolate?) or to take on a spiritual discipline such as fasting or meditation.

What if this Lenten season, though, we looked beyond personal disciplines and committed to creating beloved communities in our own backyards - communities reflecting the inclusive and healing



love that Jesus modeled as he made his way to the cross?

"Beloved Community" was first coined by 20th-Century American philosopher Josiah Royce. However, it was the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who popularized it, using "beloved community" of-

ten in speeches to illustrate God's kingdom truly a kin-dom. King's beloved community was not a far-fetched utopia, though, but rather an attainable society based on justice for all and selfless love of one another. For King, a community became "beloved" when every person had their basic needs met.

As production of this devotional approached, I kept thinking about the commitment many of our PC (USA) congregations are making to become Matthew 25 churches. By doing so, they are building beloved communities that are dismantling racism, eradicating poverty and revitalizing ministries by serving others boldly. I wanted to capture the many ways Jesus' words in Matthew 25 are being lived out and thus, creating beloved communities. This devotional itself is a reflection of a beloved community, featuring the voices of 19 ordained ministers, chaplains, lay pastors and ruling elders. These men and women, from different walks of life, belong to the Presbytery of the Pacific - a place where "Matthew 25 work has been going on for years," says the Rev. Heidi Worthen Gamble, mission catalyst. Their stories - and writing styles - differ, but they all have this in common: They are passionate in wanting to see God's love reign among them. As you journey with these writers, it is my prayer that a vision for how to become a beloved community where God has placed you dawns this Easter.

Throughout this devotional are early mosaics depicting the life of Christ. Each piece of stone or glass used to create a piece of art will be a reminder that it is together, in community, that we create God's beautiful kingdom. Spend time reflecting on each picture, envisioning what you can add to the "beloved community."

"Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house: when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? - Isaiah 58:6-7

How fragile we are. How delicate our existence, when we're truly honest with ourselves. If the practice of fasting shows me anything, it's that I am only a few days away from my body shutting down.

I live in an area where most people are one paycheck away from being on the street. With the rising cost of housing and the stagnation of wages, it can be hard for those in our communities to get by many fall into homelessness. In a recent community forum, I referred to the people sleeping in tents under a nearby overpass as my neighbors. Someone snapped back, "They really aren't our neighbors. They're not from our town." The familiar words from the Gospel of Luke echoed in my ear, "And who is my neighbor?"

In the face of Isaiah's words, I am convicted. Bring the homeless into my house? Not likely. I am too busy using my children's protection as an excuse. My children, who turn around and beg me for a dollar to give to our "neighbor" sitting outside the post office.

How fragile I am in my sinful blindness. Today as we mark our bodies with the sign of fragility, with ash prominent and black, may our eyes be open in a new way to see the fragility all around us.

God, as I begin this journey of Lent, show me the weaknesses I am blind to. Create space in m heart to sit with uncomfortable and uncertain feelings. Show me one small step to take as I follow you. Amen. CS

Orfe is a well-respected composer of various genre of music. So we feature the latest creation of Dr. Orfe, who lives right here in the Moss-Bradley neighborhood and is currently organist of First Methodist Church, Peoria. Clarinetist David Gresham joins Dr. Orfe at the piano for this first hearing of an important new work.

Then we move backward a century ... to the twentieth century ... and the music of the prolific French composer, Olivier Messiaen (1908 – 1992), and his dazzling "Quartet for the End of Time", composed in 1941. Usually we think of four string instruments when we think of a quartet, but this quartet consists of a piano, violin, clarinet and cello ... a haunting combination of timbres that express this music in a most dramatic fashion. Joining Dr. Orfe are cellist Adrianna Ransom, violinist Kelsey Klopfenstein and clarinetist David Gresham.

This is both beautiful and challenging music. And yet, it is worth the time to hear. Messiaen defined French music in the second half of the twentieth century with his music ... much for organ, but also many other works for chamber groups and for orchestra. All his works are spiritually centered, and most often scripture quotes accompany each movement. Messiaen's mystical French Catholicism is rarely far from the surface of his music. The Quartet is essentially a musical expression of the book of The Revelation ... the last book of the Bible.

We invite you to come, join us in this most wonderful program ... and bring some friends and neighbors to enjoy the time, too. Admission is free with a free-will offering received as you depart following the concert. The Spring brochure for the Iben Series should be in your hands by the time you receive this copy of the Window. Extra brochures are available in the church pews and narthex to share with others the wide variety of musical offerings of the Iben Spring series.


