Matthew 25 Certificate of Commitment

A MATTHEW 25 CHURCH

Pastor Denise Clark-Jones

At the June 8 meeting, the Westminster Session voted to register as a "Matthew 25" church. For several years, the Lead Presbyter for Transformation of Great Rivers Presbytery, Rev. Ryan Landino, has urged me to have Westminster join 16 other churches in the presbytery as well as the Synod of Lincoln Trails, as a designated Matthew 25 church. I did not pursue it because, in my mind, Westminster has always been a Matthew 25 church. After the lockdown, we began to be a church with a larger congregation online. Not everyone who participates in worship with us online knows the history of Westminster's commitment – past and present -- to Jesus' call to his disciples to 'do for the least of these who are God's children, as we would do for Christ.' This public affirmation of discipleship identifies Westminster's mission to the poor, especially those in our local community. We hope that others will want to join us in worship and mission.

What is a Matthew 25 Church?

"The Matthew 25 vision of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) began with an overture from Cascades Presbytery to the 222nd General

MINISTRY UPDATES

Assembly (2016). This overture called Presbyterians to be a missional people, actively engaging the world in the name of Jesus Christ. The 223rd General Assembly (2018) reaffirmed this commitment, distilling a number of other overtures into a sharper focus on three areas:

building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism and eradicating systemic poverty.

These actions of the General Assembly are consistent with our belief that we are "saved to serve" — delivered from sin and death in order to show the love, justice and mercy of Jesus in our words and deeds.

The themes of the Matthew 25 invitation are grounded in the gospel. Jesus calls us to serve with and for "the least of these" (Matthew 25:40) — not as a group to be pitied, but as people who are deeply loved by Jesus. They de-center our assumptions about what it means to be a beloved child of God. They challenge the authenticity of our faith and remind us that what we do matters to God. The tenets of the Matthew 25 vision are also embedded in our denomination's spiritual DNA. The Presbyterian/ Reformed tradition is marked by a deep concern for the flourishing of all people. Our confessions make this clear. For instance, the Confession of 1967 condemns the evil of systemic poverty in our world. The Confession of Belhar challenges us to confront racism in church and society. A Brief Statement of Faith imagines congregations fully alive in the glory of God. These themes are evident in the life of the PC(USA) today, as many people and congregations are already involved in Matthew 25 ministries, addressing poverty, racism and congregational vitality." -- The Presbyterian Church (USA)

Why has Westminster pledged to be a Matthew 25 Church?

Although all three goals of Matthew 25 churches are part of our mission, we have selected "Ending systemic poverty" as our primary initiative because that has been the driving force behind the mission of Westminster for decades, at least. In 1974, the West-



minster Infant Care Center was opened to provide daycare for teenage mothers so they could complete high school. Since that time, more than 90% of the mothers completed high school and went on to college or additional vocational training. When the old church building, built in 1898, burned down in 1985 the congregation was faced with the decision to build at its existing location or move to the suburbs as so many of the downtown churches had. Because the congregation was committed to local mission, they decided to stay on Moss Ave., close to neighbors in the greatest need in Peoria. The WestMark Food pantry, housed at Westminster and operated in conjunction with St. Mark's Roman Catholic Parish, has been operating for many years. Other programs to address the issue of systemic poverty, such as a summer school for children of migrant workers, have operated when the need was not being addressed elsewhere in the city. This year, during the pandemic, when the Peoria Public Schools were on the hybrid schedule of two days in person and two days with virtual learning, Westminster housed a virtual learning center for Whittier Elementary School students whose parents were not available to oversee their schoolwork at home. A much higher percentage of Westminster's budget goes to mission, particularly local mission, than the average church budget. continue to seek more ways Westminster can address the problems of those in need. Currently, we are focusing on future uses for the Parish House that will help others live the abundant life God desires for all to share. May God guide and bless our work! - Pastor Denise

WESTMINSTER'S MISSION STATEMENT UPDATED

At the last meeting of the Westminster Session, a few changes were made to our public mission statement. There was no substantive change, only details added for clarification. The idea for this started when I attended a function at another church in the presbytery. A speaker made the comment that the host church was the only Presbyterian church in the city that affirmed the welcome of LGBT people. I looked up that church on the internet to see if they had an official designation, such as a Matthew 25 church for mission focus. and they did not. The only difference, in print, from Westminster's mission statement online, was that church specifically stated their welcoming of identifiable groups, which historically have not found as warm a welcome or been excluded from churches. To make public what is already understood and practiced at Westminster, the session voted to add words to our Mission statement. Also added were specific programs Westminster offers to help the needy. Our revised Mission Statement is as follows with the words identified for you in *italics* that have been added:

"Our Mission Statement"

Westminster Presbyterian Church's mission is to serve God with open mind, hands, and heart.

- •An understanding of how God is expressed through artistic expressions and different faith traditions.


Our hands are open to:



USHER/GREETER SCHEDULE

Dear Westminster Friends.

Since we do not have a worship committee chair at this time, I have volunteered to set up an usher schedule for the coming months. I have created a schedule that I hope works for all of you and that will get us through at least part of this ever-changing landscape. I have included everyone's phone number so that, in the event that you cannot serve on the specified date, you can find a substitute or trade dates with someone else.

The duties are simple: Staff the two tables in the narthex and answer questions for people. Dick Helfrich will be there most Sundays to work the table that takes temperatures and keeps the contact tracing lists. The other table has the bulletins, Communion elements and hand sanitizer. Whoever staffs that table just needs to greet and remind people to take a bulletin and communion pod. A third usher should be available to help answer questions and usher people to their pews. After the service, look around and make sure all of the bulletins are picked up from the pews and discarded into the recycle basket. Also, remember to light the candles a few minutes before the service and put them out as soon as the last hymn begins. That's about all there is to it.

I thank you so much for being willing to help out at this challenging time. Many hands make light work and it is such a blessing to have people willing to pitch in. We will see what the future brings and what changes need to be made in weeks subsequent to the end of August. We are all in this together.


