

# ALL SAINTS' SERVICE - NOVEMBER 3, 10 AM *Presbyterian Mission*

In early Christian tradition, saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversary of a martyr's death — his or her "birthday" as a saint. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs (particularly due to the persecution of Diocletian) that it was hard to give them all their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints. known and unknown.

All Saints' Day has a rather different focus in the Reformed tradition. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, the emphasis is on the ongoing sanctification of the *whole* people of God. Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. This is an appropriate time to give thanks to members of the community of faith who have died in the past year. We also pray that we may be counted among the company of the faithful in God's eternal realm.

All Saints' Day has been celebrated on November 1 since the year 835. Previously it had been connected with the Easter season as a feast of all martyrs. 5

The Faithful of Every Generation

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 150-151)

All Saints' Day is a time to rejoice in all who through the ages have faithfully served the Lord. The day reminds us that we are part of one continuing, living communion of saints. It is a time to claim our kinship with the "glorious company of apostles ... the noble fellowship of prophets ... the white-robed army of martyrs" (Te Deum). It is a time to express our gratitude for all who in ages of darkness kept the faith, for those who have taken the gospel to the ends of the earth, for prophetic voices who have called the church to be faithful in life and service, for all who have witnessed to God's justice and peace in every nation.

To rejoice with all the faithful of every generation expands our awareness of a great company of witnesses above and around us like a cloud (Hebrews 12:1). It lifts us out of a preoccupation with our own immediate situation and the discouragements of the present. In the knowledge that others have persevered, we are encouraged to endure against all odds (Hebrews 12:1-2). Reminded that God was with the faithful of the past, we are reassured that God is with us today, moving us and all creation toward God's end in time. In this context, it is appropriate for a congregation on All Saints' Day to commemorate the lives of those who died during the previous year. \$\mathscr{Y}\$

Join us Sunday, November 3, at the 10 a.m. service, where we will remember those who have gone on to the Church Triumphant.

"Hi, my name is Skyla Washington. I have one half sister and one half -brother on my mom's side, but I am the only child my Dad has had. I have a one-

year old daughter, Ka'myla, and she is truly my best friend. Literally, when you have a baby you tend to lose a lot of friends but God gave me a lifetime best friend. I am in school and when I graduate High School I want to go to law school and become a lawyer. It's hard, but I am going to finish school with a child. I know I can do it because I got to make sure she has a life



that I didn't have. Some days I want to give up, but I look at my daughter and she just makes me want to do good in life. I show her that it's hard, but it can be done as long as you put your mind to it. I am so grateful to have Westminster Infant Care because without them there would be no way I would always attend school and be on time every day. I'm glad to even have Pat, he picks us up every morning safely and gets us home safely. I am so thankful to know my child is in a safe and loving place. Thank you all so much!

### **IT WAS 1974**

Westminster Infant Care Center opened its doors 45 years ago this year. For the past 45 years WICC

has sought to provide a practical way for teenage parents to complete their education and thereby ensure a better future for themselves and their families. The ultimate goal of the Westminster Infant Care Center is to provide the necessary support of the teen parents and their children by offering a caring, nurturing, learning environment for the children while the mothers finish their education....thus assuring a brighter future for the parent and the child alike.

Additionally, transportation for the parent and their child to and from the Center is vital for the success of the teen parent. Every school day morning the parents and children are picked up by our shuttle bus and taken to the Center where everyone is given healthy breakfast snacks and juice. The parents ride the school bus to school, or the shuttle bus delivers them to school if needed. After school, the school bus delivers the parents back to the Center. Then the parents and their children are safely returned home by our shuttle bus. Parents are free to pursue their diploma while their child is lovingly cared for by licensed and caring staff.

Education is the major key to a successful life that is more likely to be free from the effects of social injustice. Educated parents are able to provide stable and enriched environments for their children, helping them to become the next generation of achievers who break out of the poverty cycle.

Care has always been taken to select the best staff and to meet all licensing requirements for the childcare center. Our current Director, Valerie Sager has been the director for 20 years. Her assistant, Nisa Roberts, has been with her for 11 years! Not only is the staff at WICC carefully chosen, but its Board of Directors as well. It is composed of educators, childcare specialists, church members and other professionals from different parts of the community concerned with social welfare and education. The Board stands strongly behind its mission and is deeply concerned about the futures of those who become involved in the WICC program.

This year is Westminster Infant Care Center's 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary! Simple math will make it clear how many lives have been changed by this **one of a kind** program. Because it provides an answer for teen parents and sees to it that they can escape the poverty cycle by completing their education, the beneficial effects trickle down to the next generation and beyond. We may never know just how much this mission has helped our young parents and their children; however, we do know that stable households produce future stable households...and hope begets hope...lives and communities are made better.

Thank you to everyone who has served on the WICC Board of Directors, or who has been involved in any way as a past part of this vital mission of our church. Those of you who have supported us financially, prayerfully, or with your time, talents and fundraising efforts over the years, we thank as well. Westminster Infant Care Center, for nearly half a century with the support of this church, has been "a beacon on the West Bluff."

# SPOTLIGHT ON MISSIONS PEORIA FRIENDSHIP HOUSE

Since 1951, Peoria Friendship House of Christian Service (PFH) has made a powerful difference in the Near North side and the East Bluff neighborhoods of Peoria, and beyond. PFH was founded as a response to the great need for assistance to individuals and families living in deep poverty. Located on Peoria's near north side, their Advocacy, Coaching, Education and Support approach provides wrap-around services supported by short and long-term coaching for both the Latino and English speaking communities. They provide valuable services, such as food, clothing, youth education, adult education, employment preparation, and finance and employment coaching, while encouraging lasting change for those they serve. PFH is dedicated to providing hope and guidance that offers a "hand-up" rather than handouts.

One of the valuable programs PFH offers is La Familia (Latino Outreach). For over 25 years they have established a great relationship with our Spanish speaking brothers and sisters. Translation services, immigration services are offered, and together they help strengthen our community as a whole. As Westminster's pastor continues to re-

# **TIS THE SEASON TO GIVE THANKS**

In every culture I know of, there is a celebration of the harvest. Though we no longer live in an agrarian society, the rhythm of the earth's creative cycle seems to be hardwired within us. Madison Avenue gives us little time for rest and reflection. In our consumer-driven society, we are rushed from Halloween to Christmas by the mighty marketeers that dominate what we see on store shelves and in the ever more intrusive world of media advertising on the internet. Our formal celebration of Thanksgiving is not a religious holiday, but gratitude is an essential component of our faith that we should be experiencing every day.

Thanksgiving is a time of the year when we can put ourselves into a freeze-frame of sorts, so that we might open our eyes to the many blessings in our lives that we are enjoying now. We spend a lot of time in the past or in the future – dwelling on loss or fantasizing about the future. This keeps us in our heads more than in the world and what is available to us now. Living in the present is expressed by this Zen Buddhist saying: "Wherever I go, there I am." Isn't that the way Jesus traveled with his disciples?

Jesus was super-observant – he noticed the people that most did not. He saw need others ignored. Whatever the circumstances, he gave thanks to God and lived in the precious moments of his earthly existence. He knew who he was and his purpose in life and lived authentically every day.

In a few weeks from now, you may be sitting around a table with family or friends and asked to name things for which you are thankful. How can you possibly have genuine, heartfelt answers, if you have not been paying attention as the blessings have been coming to you? Not seeing, or denying, our own good fortune separates us from others. When we do not see the good things we enjoy, we also fail to see the lack of good things in others' lives.

So, speaking paradoxically, gratitude is both see-

ing and not seeing. Genuine gratitude transcends all boundaries we place to defend ourselves from the world beyond ourselves. True gratitude is blind to societal borderlines and differences that would deny our connectedness with each other and creation .

On November 3, we will celebrate All Saints' Sunday when we will celebrate the blessings of those believers that have come before us and shone the light of Christ on our own faith journeys. In this season of thanksgiving, let us reflect on the blessing of the church in our lives and the church's mission to be a blessing to the lives of those in our community and the world that are most in need of our sharing our blessings with them.



As we enter the season of autumn, we enter the season of Metal in the Five Element form of Taiji. It is a time of reflection, a time of introspection, of refinement. We decide what we should keep and what we should let go of in life.

The element of Metal draws us inward toward our center. The organs associated with this time of year are the lungs and small intestine. The example we see around us is that of a tree which lets go of its leaves that have made its food and draws that energy in to be stored in its roots for future use.

The Five Element Taiji system was created by Master Chungliang Al Huiang. He created his system by combining Yang Style Taiji, Bagua and Qigong. His system is based on the 5 elements of Fire, Water, Wood, Earth and Metal. The system has additional forms called Circles. Each Circle represents one of the elements. The fluidity of Yang Style Taiji, the moving meditative stepping of Bagua and the mindful visualizations and breathing of Qigong come together to create a beautiful and powerful meditative dance of nature.

The Five Element form and the Circles are short forms, easily learned and contain the wisdom of

# AUTUMN IS HERE AND SO IS THE TIME WE FALL BACK NOVEMBER 3, 2019

Set your clocks back one hour and enjoy some extra sleep or use that time to do your semi-annual chores. It's easy to forget regular home maintenance checks. But make them a part of your time-changing routine, and you can help protect your family and house from a host of preventable problems. Here are a few tips of things to check around your home while you're switching your clocks and smoke alarm batteries.

#### A SAFETY CHECKLIST FOR DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

- ☐ Replace batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Then test each detector according to the maker's instructions.
- ☐ Replace batteries in your flashlights. The last thing you want if the power goes out is a dead flashlight. Also, do this for any weather alert radios you may have.
- ☐ Flip the mattresses in the Fall and Spin/Flip the mattresses in the Spring.
- ☐ Give light fixtures some attention. Remove light globes and clean them to remove dust and bugs. Also consider replacing incandescent bulbs with more energy-efficient compact fluorescent lights (CFLs).
- □ Close off unused rooms. It could help save money on heating costs during winter and air conditioning costs in the summer. Energy.gov suggests keeping the rooms at least 55 degrees F, though, to prevent any pipes from freezing.
- ☐ Check your meds. Get rid of expired medicines but before you throw them in the trash, research safe, responsible disposal methods for each medication. Restock basic over-the-counter items like cough syrups, decongestants, antihistamines, and fever and pain reducers.
- ☐ Whip appliances into shape. Get the best performance from your kitchen appliances by cleaning them according to the manufacturer's directions. Spot problems by using inexpensive oven and fridge/freezer thermometers to check temps.
- ☐ Check your pantry for any expired foods.
- ☐ Clean out your dryer duct for any lint that has accumulated.
- $\hfill\square$  Change the baking soda in the refrigerator and freezer.
- ☐ Change your water filters.

- ☐ Check your furnace filter. Energy.gov states that a clogged air filter can restrict airflow and increase energy consumption between 5 and 15 percent.

  Depending on the type of filter your furnace uses, clean or replace it now and at least one to three months thereafter.
- ☐ Reprogram your thermostat. Be sure to change it from summer to winter settings before you turn the heat on, and vice versa.

### And, since it is Fall, add these to your chores list:

- ☐ Remove debris from gutters and downspouts.
- ☐ Have your chimney inspected and cleaned.
- ☐ Check for cracks in doors and windows. Use caulk or insulation stripping to seal any gaps you find.
- ☐ Drain your garden hoses and store them away.
- ☐ Check the expiration date on your fire extinguishers. If it's past its time, research the proper way to dispose of it and pick a new one up pronto.
- ☐ If you have a programmable home security system (say, the motion detectors are only on while you're at work) make sure you not only update the time, but check your programs to make sure they're still applicable as we head towards warmer weather.
- □ Lastly, double-check your door locks. The winter weather may have taken a toll on them, causing the locking mechanisms to jam up, handles to become loose, or keys to corrode or rust. While you're outside, check your exterior lights and replace any bulbs that are dimming or have burned out.

Follow this list and you'll not only make sure your home and family are safe and sound, but you'll be just a few steps closer to being prepared for that long-awaited spring and summer weather. And, don't forget to turn your clocks back one hour before you go to bed Saturday night.
